'Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.'

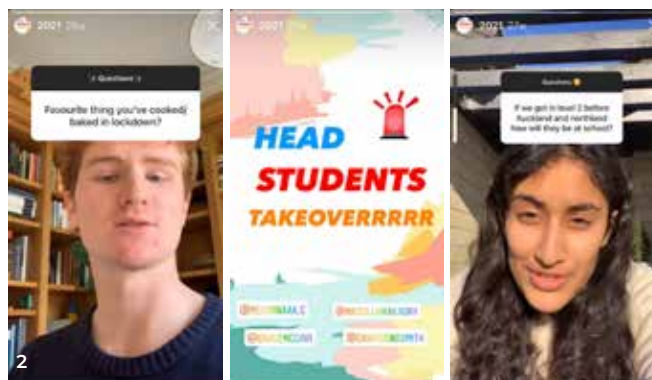

Online learning - has this proved to be a highlight or a lowlight this year? I am aware that some students love this way of learning and others find it really hard. We have learned so much as a school through this process. Firstly, to our hard-working teachers who were constantly juggling their own family lives while teaching continued - thank you. So many parents wrote in, acknowledging their work and thanking our teachers for their constant support of their children. I am grateful for the recognition you gave to such outstanding teachers. Thank you! We also learned that the focus on wellbeing was so much more of a priority during lockdown. I am grateful to our wellbeing team, our Deputy Principal, Jess Patrick and our sports team for providing the wellbeing tracker and the many toolkits which supported our students. The biggest challenge we faced was providing the hybrid model of learning - online learning and onsite learning together at the same time. This proved to be unsustainable so we were all really grateful when we returned to Level 2 and could invite all our students back on site. I am grateful to have come to know so many more parents across our school community. The many phone calls, emails, chats on the side-line or in town have enabled me to come to know our parent community that much better. I am grateful for that.

The other aspect of 2021 school life has been learning new ways of doing things and then realising that when we got back on site we should continue with some of that patterning. Sometimes being pushed to do something a different way actually forces us to realise that the new way is better than before.

We certainly started 2021 with strong achievement rates from our 2020 National Certificate in Educational Achievement (NCEA) and International Baccalaureate (IB) results. Lance Jones and Steven Wang both received the IB Top Scholar's Award for outstanding achievement in the IB Diploma. This recognises the top IB students in New Zealand who achieved 40 or more points in the IB Diploma.

Our NCEA pass rates in 2020 were:

- Level 1 – 96%
- Level 2 – 99%
- Level 3 – 96%

Given the lockdowns we have had this year, we have closely tracked our student achievement rates, with teachers having to collect evidence of learning and achievement all year to ensure no student was disadvantaged by the Covid interruptions. At the time of writing this, I was so pleased to see how many students have attended the end of year examinations, knowing that the rigour of doing an examination means that they have the added discipline to really stick at things. We are hopeful for good results in the New Year. Our students have been amazing; coping with the tough twists and turns of learning this year.

I want to make special mention of our international students. Some of our students have not been home to see their families for two years. This has been so tough, and yet they have continued in boarding or in homestay accommodation and just kept on going. The fantastic support of Mrs Fuller and Mrs Joubert has really ensured these students have been pastorally cared for to an exceptional level. I am very grateful to them for their consistent commitment. It has not gone unnoticed, and I know our international students are very grateful. A few of our international students will go home now to spend time with their families and return to us at the start of Term 2.

Our Deans have continued to offer strong academic and pastoral care to every student. A Dean's role never finishes, as there is always a matter to attend to. We are fortunate that our team care deeply about our students and will go the extra mile to offer whatever support a student requires. I am grateful to this team for their dedication and kindness to our students.

This year saw the appointment of two Chaplains to support our school community, following the departure of Chaplain Michael Bennett. We miss his good cheer and dancing for sure! Matt Martyn, our Head Chaplain, and our Assistant Chaplain - Vanessa MacCarthy, have given such fantastic service in the short time they have been with us. Some of their goals is to strengthen our service opportunities for students and continue to provide support alongside our Wellbeing Centre staff.

I continue to be very proud of our Prep students' who year after year give so generously to the Salvation Army (pictured). Their commitment is appreciated and serves to remind us of the need to be generous and think of others ahead of ourselves.



The Wellbeing curriculum for students is a key focus for St Peter's, and each year we review this to enable improvement to be made for the following year. This year one of our parents offered to sponsor a Wellbeing Award to recognise a student who has demonstrated values showing care, empathy, service to others, wellbeing, and resilience in their final year at St Peter's. This scholarship will be used to assist them to balance their wellbeing when studying or working post Year 13. The monetary incentive could be used in many ways, e.g., for a leadership course, to assist students to continue on a pathway, or allow them to contribute to society through service. Jack Nielsen was the recipient for 2021. Congratulations Jack. Thanks to our sponsor, Pragma Homes, for bringing this award to our school.

Acknowledging our parent community is an aspect of school life that I believe is very important. You walk alongside your children and trust us to look after them, provide an excellent education, strengthen their character development, love

them, and nurture them. I am very grateful that you have walked with us this year. It has been very unsettling and, on some occasions, upsetting. Thank you for your ongoing positive support. We really do want to do our very best. We are family, and I value that very much.

I would also like to acknowledge, and thank our St Peter's Parents' Association; an outstanding group of parents who always step up to support, offer kindness, and give back.

Our boarding community offer such warmth to our overall school community, and whilst their year has also been interrupted, I have been impressed with the way in which they came back to school and focussed; re-connecting with their boarding brothers and sisters. I am grateful to our boarding staff for their hard work and commitment to the pastoral care of our students.

Our senior leadership team have continued to work hard for St Peter's with each member contributing to making learning experiences even better for our students. I thank them for their tenacity and resilience this year. The Trust Board had a change of leadership part way through this year, and I am grateful to this group for their commitment and hard work as well, especially to our chair, John Macaskill-Smith, for his leadership and input.

As this year comes to a close, I remain very grateful for the people; He Tangata, He Tangata, He Tangata. How blessed we are to have such a wonderfully rich community to work within. We could dwell on the challenges, knowing we have learned from them, but going forward it is the people for whom I am grateful. Take care and best wishes always.

Chaplain



Like many of you, I am still trying to process the year that has been. Of course, there are the obvious hurdles that life threw up our way, yet many of these challenges have presented opportunities to be creative around how we work and how we look out for one-another.

It was a joy to start my role as Chaplain at St Peter's alongside Vanessa McCarthy, being able to navigate the big campus and endless activity that St Peter's thrives on in those first few weeks. A standout for both of us was being consistently welcomed by kind and helpful staff along the way while we found our pace and place in the school.

The School's charity engagement this year has been inspiring:

- Relay For Life saw the students (led by their passionate Swears Deans) raise over \$15k in what ended up being a very meaningful and impactful event for all.
- World Vision 40 Hour Famine - the students continued to impress, smashing the \$10k goal and involving over 180 students in Hanna House's appeal to raise money and awareness for people affected by Covid in Sub Saharan Africa. This huge effort earned St Peter's the 'Kaiwhakahu – Advocacy Award', acknowledging some outstanding Student efforts in fundraising.
- Chandler took on a creative approach with their annual Salvation Army food appeal, having students bring canned goods and toiletries for those that were doing it tough. The response was overwhelming, with over 30 huge boxes filled, spilling over to be donated to the community.
- Lastly, Thornton House raised money for our sister school in Tanzania, East Africa, with the amazing Marty Siefert: organizing 400 donuts to sell, with huge support from the students who brought them all up in one sitting.

Whether it was the House Charities or any one of the incredible initiatives such as the Refugee Center partnership or hospital visit trips, it has become apparent that many of our students are not satisfied to just simply participate in a transactional approach to charity engagement. In our time here, we have seen a growing desire and move toward a more transformational approach and process of what it is to engage directly with the needs of others face-to-face.

I am mindful of some of the words that our Head Girl Meghana shared some of those with us involved during one of our appeals: *"If you can't volunteer, donate. If you can't donate, advocate. If you can't advocate, educate yourself about your privilege, and the resources we are so lucky to have."*

The Religious Education team have done a superb job, whether that's in the classroom or in Chapel, it has been a wonderful challenge and privilege for the team to continue to share the rich truths of the Christian tradition with our students and community in various ways.

In our modern moment we keep finding these ancient truths being able to land where people live and pray this will continue for St Peter's for many decades to come.

May we each be able to identify where we may have grown in mind, body, and spirit this year and look to 2022 with wonder awe and optimism.

Trust Board



2020 was a year like no other - followed closely by 2021 which was one out of the box! At a global level Covid continued to rewrite the way we all live, work and learn. While we had the benefit of a decent pause between outbreaks here in New Zealand, which lured many into a sense of normality, in the end Covid continued to cause massive disruption. With the benefits of what we learned in 2020, St Peter's was quick to respond and to re-establish one of the best online learning experiences in the country.

While never a replacement for in person learning, the comprehensive commitment from our staff saw more high quality facilitated online learning being made available than most New Zealand students had access to. This was followed by new on-site experiences with masks and restricted gathering, yet we still managed to come through Covid-free and able to support all students in reaching their end of year objectives.

In other areas Covid presented greater challenges; seeing the postponement of junior production and a wide range of annual sporting events. After all the training and practice this was a frustrating place to land, but we now have the opportunity to reset and restart.

2021 saw a range of other changes within St Peter's. We saw the departure of Dale Burden the Executive Principal. The Trust Board has seen the first of the departures of long-standing Board members (including the previous Chair John Erkkila after 14 years of service to St Peter's) as they come to the end of their maximum terms over the next 12 months.

With any change there is always the opportunity to stop, check and reconfirm the future. That is what the Trust Board has done over the second half of 2021, engaging widely with stakeholders to explore what a St Peter's education stands for. This is to ensure our students continue to be future equipped, and that we effectively balance tradition with innovation to remain at the leading edge of learning.

We have been:

- Confirming our future point of difference (what sets us apart from others). This will guide the future direction and quality of the school's thinking and strategic planning
- Articulating what a future graduate profile looks like which reflects our community's aspirations for the young people we graduate and meets the needs of industry today and tomorrow.
- Engaging the school's communities (internal and external) in a process that brings people together in discussions about the future of the school and builds a collaborative culture as the foundation for new ways of working.
- Exploring the future leadership needs for St Peter's, Cambridge - both the school and the broader group of affiliated organisations and commercial operations.

St Peter's has developed, grown, and evolved since the school was founded in 1936, but the founding ethos has endured - that holistic development of mind, body and spirit grows well-rounded people with the character, mindset, and desire to serve their communities and to be outstanding.

Our community has also grown in number and mix of students enrolled at St Peter's. St Peter's has achieved steady roll growth over the last five years, despite the impacts of Covid and a reduction of international students from 2020. Domestic enrolments have increased by (7%) between 2017-2021, giving an overall number of students of 1220.

In the future, clearly articulating a vision for St Peter's that is reflective of the school's direction, values, strategic goals, and resources, is critical for focusing the efforts of academic, art, sports, and administrative teams on what really matters, including: alignment of curriculum, delivery, processes and services with school priorities and values.

Alongside this critical piece of work on the future, the Trust Board has also stepped out publicly, to address the past, acknowledge historical abuse and apologise to past students. While the initial media interest dominated the discussion, the process has been incredibly important and engaging between the school and past students. It has opened the door and provided a safe and supportive way for past students to re-engage with St Peter's and talk about some events that in the past we didn't always know how to manage. For some it has provided closure and for others it is the start of a journey towards addressing and healing the past. For the Trust Board it has raised further questions, alongside the WorkSafe investigation earlier in the year; further driving a determination to ensure that our future is built on full transparency, and a clear understanding and active management of the duty of care we have to all our people, students, staff, and the broader community.

As we step into 2022, the Board is considering ways we can acknowledge and remind ourselves of the past and use that as a point to ensure that the future is focused on building the greatest possibilities for all individuals who become part of our community.

Finally, I would like to thank all students, parents, families, staff, and supporters for sticking with us during the year – the one out of the box!

St Peter's is a magic place, it's a beautiful setting, but the true magic comes from its people. The partnership between students, staff, parents, and the community – we are all here through independent choice and it's that independence that brings us together.

2022 will bring further Covid challenges, but it is also bringing enormous opportunity and exciting new frontiers for St Peter's.

Foundation



St Peter's was founded on the generosity and vision of Arthur Broadhurst. Upon this base, the generosity of past generations has provided the excellent learning environment that we take so much for granted today. It is fundamental to the continuing excellence of St Peter's in providing the very best opportunities for our young people, to continue this tradition of giving.

In order to enable this, the St Peter's Foundation was launched in 2002, and is now an integral part of the school family bringing together current, past and future supporters. The Foundation's primary objective was to provide an entity in which donors could feel confident that their philanthropy was being well-managed and used for the benefit of St Peter's and our students.

Two key points were established necessary to gain the trust of donors and give the Foundation credibility. They are:

1. The independence of the Foundation from both the School Management and the School Trust Board.
2. To build and maintain an enduring capital fund to support the financial independence of St Peter's School.

This enables the Foundation to raise and distribute funds in a manner that ensures donors that their donations are used for their donated purpose only, and that the capital raised remains sacrosanct.

Contributions to the school are funded from income derived from the capital base, or if directed by a donor, to a particular scholarship or capital project approved by the school.

The ability of the Foundation to provide an increasing

number of part or full scholarships goes a long way to enabling St Peter's school to remain independent and continue to be a centre of excellence.

The past two years have been exceptionally challenging, not only for the school community, but all of New Zealand, and indeed the world, as we navigate our way to a "new normal" beyond Covid and its variants. Through this time with its capital base already in place, the Foundation was able to immediately support St Peter's and a number of families of current students, through some hardship support as well as deferred fee payments where that was of useful assistance. As a Foundation we were also very pleased to see families who were able to assist other families as we demonstrated in deeds, not just words, that the St Peter's community is a community that looks after its own.

The preserved capital fund of the Foundation is a "rainy day" fund of sorts. The skies opened and we were there, ready and able to help.

We now look forward to continue to prudently manage the existing funds, as well as working with donors to further build the capital base and scholarship funds of the Foundation in order to ensure the opportunities that St Peter's provides continues to be available to our young people.

Happy Birthday to St Peter's, Cambridge, now 85 years old.

This has been a second year of disruptions to proposed events due to ongoing global pandemic restrictions, and it has made planning events challenging. Whilst the 2021 Distinguished Alumni Awards evening, due to be held in November, was unable to proceed, four distinguished alumni were celebrated. These talented alumni are entrepreneur and philanthropist Ray McKimm (1960–1963), aquaculture innovator Sunil Khadri (1976–1981), singer and songwriter and our first celebration of achievement in the Arts, Anna Hawkins (2001–2004), and innovator Craig Piggott (2006–2012).

A ten-year reunion was cancelled for a second year, and unfortunately we had to postpone a special event to launch alumnus Matthew Saville's (1989–1995) film, *Juniper*, at the Tivoli cinema in Cambridge due to Level 3 restrictions.

Fortunately, the Alumni vs the St Peter's 1st XI cricket game did proceed in February, where the alumni held their own. Sadly, the alumni soccer team didn't get an outing as the proposed alumni sports day scheduled for October was unable to proceed.

On 1 July a number of Broadhurst alumni and their guests were invited back to the school for brunch in the dining room and a wonderful organ concert in the Chapel (pictured). The organ needs extensive remedial work, but alumnus and former staff member Mark Eyre managed to coax some wonderful music from this aging instrument.

He, and St Peter's organist, Eon Malan, gave a stunning programme of music, even including some requests. The afternoon concluded with a magnificent cake to celebrate St Peter's 85th birthday.

The Tokyo Olympic and Paralympic Games featured ten St Peter's alumni. These were: equestrian Jesse Campbell (2003–2007), sailing siblings Sam Meech (2004–2006) and Molly Meech (2006), rower Lucy Spoors (2008), Distinguished Alumna and athlete Camille Buscomb (2005–2008), cyclists Rushlee Buchanan (1999–2005) and Ellesse Andrews (2016–2027), hockey player Frances Davies (2012–2014), footballer Jamie Searle (2016–2018), and para cyclist Anna Taylor (2007–2009). We congratulate them all, in particular Ellesse on the silver medal.

Former staff members who died this year are remembered. Teacher, sporting coach, play director, costume maker (1960–1995) Frances Swears died in March aged 90. In April, Jean Blomkamp's life was celebrated in a service at the St Peter's Chapel. Jean was secretary to St Peter's second headmaster, David Thornton (1973–1987). Michelle Macdonald (2006–2018), teacher of food and fabrics lost her battle with cancer in September.

Moving into 2022, donations received enable the school to plan restoration of the organ. More alumni activities are proposed and all are hopeful they can proceed.

I'm a debater, but I know the difference between stubbornness and persistence, I see our student athletes wake up at 4.30am to train, and our musicians spend hours practicing, 2,3,5,7,8 times a week. Thank you for teaching me that it's only through passion, resilience, and grit that we can grow.

I work hard, but not just for myself and material gains, but because my great-grandpa had to fight for my grandma's right to go to school until Year 6, and because my dad grew up without electricity, or running water. All their money went towards education, as they believed that was the way they could improve the lives of their families, and wider communities. It worked. Thank you to our student coaches, student tutors, house committees, the student executive, the boarding house leaders, prefects, anyone who just checks up on their friends, and picks up litter around the school, for lifting up our community.

I am unashamedly proud of where I come from and know that these 'differences' are strengths, because my parents continue to work 90-hour weeks to provide this education, because I see those in our school community with disabilities, with other differences, visible or invisible, work twice, three times as hard, silently, in order to achieve their own definition of success.

Thank you to the students who recognise that the kind of opportunities this school offers are so incredibly rare, that there have been sacrifices made to provide them, and that they are aching to be seized.

Thank you to Covid, all those with family and friends overseas or who may have passed away recently - for showing me that love and unconditional support overcomes geography, and time. I am supportive, empathetic, and know it's ok not to be ok, only because there are students who are brave, courageous and strong enough to reach out when they're not.

Thank you to the bomb threat, and the volatility of this year - for showing me the importance of both preparedness, and adaptability. Characteristics that Deputy students Grace and Dawson both show constantly.

So thank you for all those pieces, no matter how small, that have shaped my mosaic during my time at St Peter's.

Student Leadership

2021 was meant to be the year everyone moved on beyond Covid. However, this turned out not to be the case.

Thankfully though the first term started with a brief understanding of normal, and enabled head students to be visible and effective in leading around the school. The 2021 vintage of 51 outstanding young leaders who became prefects will forever be remembered with great fondness. This prefect group truly epitomised what it meant to be servant leaders. Service was their mantra. This was evident during Spirit Week which was an outstanding highlight. Who will forget the spandex clad prefects leading the student body in various dance moves, but who also used the entire week to generate school spirit? House leaders and prefects were also at the forefront of House athletics and swimming competitions. Thornton House found the magic formula and won both events, achieved through their high levels of participation.

Swears House charity event Relay for Life was well attended, winning the school's trophy for the third consecutive year as the school raising the most for the Cancer Society. This was wonderfully led by the Swears house team, but supported by all of leaders and beyond.

Year 13 leaders were pleased they were able to deliver the school ball in term 1 as they dodged Covid lockdowns. The response of students to the ball also highlighted what a wonderful and well led Year 13 group the 2021 cohort were.

It was inspiring to hear about the impact of the Prep Service Prefects, supported by others, amongst the Year 7 and 8 student body. According to Mr O'Connell the prefects established a new benchmark for the way they interacted with and supported the younger students.

Being a school prefect meant students had responsibilities through their various portfolios, each portfolio working with a staff member towards achieving goals that would improve life for each St Peter's student. The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award is a globally recognised programme that provides development opportunities for young people. Individuals work at the three different levels (bronze, silver and gold) to challenge themselves, help others, and achieve personal growth.

As an Award unit, St Peter's is able to register students for the award, validate assessors, and sign off completed sections. The award complements the school's founding ethos of "body, mind, and spirit", and many of the activities that students participate in daily can go towards an award – for example, music or dance tuition, sports teams, coaching, or assisting in school or youth groups.

The effort of many valued St Peter's staff and community members must be acknowledged for the support they offer students, by way of being award mentors and assessors. Their dedication to the awardees is greatly appreciated and without any doubt they are the richer for having meaningful input in their lives.

This year, over 120 students registered across the three levels. To date, 33 students have completed 34 Awards (18 bronze, 15 silver and 1 gold) and more are on track to finish by the end of the year.

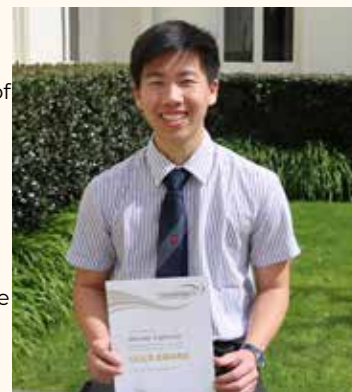

The Student Futures Consultants, Barbara Read and Sarah King, have worked alongside the year level Deans and teaching staff to provide individual learning programmes to assist St Peter's students to make informed decisions regarding their future pathways.

This year the team co-hosted the Cambridge Community Careers Expo in collaboration with Cambridge High School. The schools worked with the Cambridge community to profile local businesses and tertiary providers, providing information for students when they transition from school to further education or employment. Tertiary providers from across New Zealand attended the Careers Expo, giving students the opportunity to speak directly to a Recruitment Liaison person about their study options. This connection proved valuable when face-to-face meetings were changed to Zoom calls during lockdown, to assist our senior students to make decisions about their course selection for the following year.

The Student Futures team also worked alongside several students, with support from their Deans, to gain vocational pathway qualifications this year, as well as passing their NCEA qualification. Students worked at local businesses across various industries, including: vehicle manufacturing, mechanical automotive, building construction, early childhood education, and farming. Further to the work experience opportunities students also attended the Wintec Waikato Trades Academy participating in courses including Sports Science, Construction and Infrastructure, and Mechanical Engineering.

Congratulations to Vocational Pathway students who completed their Tertiary level qualifications, in partnership with local businesses and their Industry Training Provider. Jack Livingstone achieved his pre-trade Automotive Mechanical qualification. Morgan Bolstad achieved his BCITO Gateway certificate. Jacob Dover achieved his L3 Automotive Engineering Certificate. Shivon Hanham achieved her L3 Certificate in Sport and Exercise Science, and Stacey Bell completed her Primary Industries Skills qualification.

St Peter's is grateful to the supportive Cambridge community as the Student Futures department are often contacted by local businesses offering employment

opportunities, both part-time and full-time, to students. These opportunities are promoted to all senior students via their weekly Student Futures email, which also includes reminders about upcoming events. If students are looking for part-time work during term-time or in school holidays they are encouraged to talk to the Student Futures team.

All students are encouraged to spend some of their school holiday gaining an insight into occupations of interest to them, as the knowledge gained from these opportunities can often shape their future decision making.

Agriculture and Horticulture Science

A record numbers of students in Agriculture and Horticulture (Ag/Hort) Science meant that a new classroom was a welcome addition to the original classroom and workshop area. In addition, Celine Pirie joined the department to teach the Year 10 and 11 classes.

Primary Industry has certainly been in the headlines throughout the past 18 months and has been a great endorsement for this subject. The introduction of the new Year 12 Primary Industries course was a popular choice with Unit tandards consisting of fencing, weather, health and safety, and checking livestock. The variety of units gave the students a great opportunity to learn some practical skills, as well as life-skills needed for the workforce.

One of the highlights of the year was taking the Year 13 students to the Te Kuiti sale yards to watch the auctioning of sheep, including one student having a go at auctioning a mob of rams. After the sale yards, they visited Te Kuiti Meats processing plant. This trip was part of learning about the export lamb market from farming management practices, through to supplying specific cuts to international markets and meeting market demand. A great example of the practical application along with the theory taught in the classroom.

Year 12 classes visited a local Dairy Goat farm to understand the environmental consequences of farming. This amazing venue demonstrated to the students that farming is a positive contribution to society and that there are great ways to work towards environmental sustainability while farming.

It was great to return to the Bay of Plenty with the Year 11s. In order to understand the kiwifruit export process, students watched and participated in: kiwifruit picking, visiting a Seeka packhouse, and touring the Tauranga Port. This was an excellent trip allowing the students to gain insight into a large horticulture process through planting, picking, packing and transporting another great New Zealand product.

Year 10 students had the opportunity to plant the next 300 Pinus Radiata seedlings for the Christmas Tree business, now in its second year. They also studied the concepts of where food comes from. These topics included studying the pork industry, aquaculture, dairy farm management systems, careers in the primary industries, crops and market gardens. It was heartening to see the many vegetables being planted, nurtured and donated to Cambridge's Community House.

The Year 9 curriculum, led by Mr Mike Kilgour, included a variety of opportunities on campus. These included: visiting the beehives, using the bee smokers, and visiting the farm to observe the Owl Farm calf rearing operation.

Another fantastic grape harvest year. Staff and students picked the grapes from the St Peter's vineyard in March to deliver to Volcanic Hill Winery in Rotorua. This year's harvest produced bottles of Rose from the Pinotage and Cabernet Franc vines and a sparkling wine from the Chardonnay grapes.

Another amazing year had in the Agriculture and Horticulture department. Curriculums continue to be tweaked, reflected on and developed as the school continuously strive to understand student needs and industry requirements. It is heartening to see the number of students interested in continuing within the primary industries in many different ways; Lincoln, Otago and Massey Universities; Telford Institute of Technology; Future Farmers Scheme; and employment within the industry.



Agribusiness

Another busy year in Agribusiness for students, especially those that entered the Innovation Awards at Fieldays at Mystery Creek. Potting Wool, Mark-it, and Tapp-it were the three innovations that students designed to help solve an issue or problem specific to their industry of interest.

The students had to: solve a problem or design a product, make a prototype, present their innovation to judges several times, and be under public scrutiny for three days. They were an absolute credit to themselves and to the school with their determination, tenacity, and excellent communication skills.

Earlier in the year both year groups visited Spring Sheep Dairy Farm and Woodstock Farm high input dairy farm. These were very worthwhile venues, and a great way to compare and contrast between industries, as well as make comparisons to St Peter's Owl Farm's systems.

Potting Wool

An innovation to use a product that is now a waste product - WOOL.

Mixed with potting mix/soil to create a growing medium for seedlings, inside plants, and young plants to grow in. This product will be 100% biodegradable. Wool absorbs water and holds onto it for long periods of time meaning that you will not need to water the plants as much as a soil-only product.

Think not having to water your indoor plants for longer periods. Using seedling trays that don't need as much watering but have the same germination success.

Tap-ITT

This innovation is an idea designed to aid farmers to help reduce time wasted fixing water troughs.

An internal tap is placed inside the trough in-front of the balcock to stop the water flowing into the trough so that it can be fixed without turning the main water supply off.

Another tap is inserted internally at the bottom of the trough to allow water to flow out if trough needs to be emptied for cleaning, moving or fixing.

Mark-it Drench Gun

Mark-It Drench Gun is a drenching gun that leaves an ink mark on the side of the sheep's mouth.

The idea behind our innovation is so when you are drenching, you don't lose your place when the sheep move within the race.

This gun helps to know which sheep have been drenched but can help build the confidence of young shepherds who may not have much experience with the task of drenching. The Mark-It drench gun is made with a stainless-steel plate which an inked sponge sits on top. Our sponge is also individually vacuum-packed to make storing and using easier.

Mark-it drench gun can identify what sheep they have drenched, therefore not doubling up or missing the sheep. As far as we can find there is no other contraption like this on the market.

Commerce

The Commerce Faculty covers the senior subjects of Accounting, Agribusiness, Business Studies, and Economics. When students ask for a comparison of these subjects this answer is often given:

- **Business Studies (and Agribusiness)** – Is where you learn to be an entrepreneur, come up with an innovative idea and look to run a business.
- **Accounting** – Is where you learn to see if the business has been successful and give advice on where to turn to next.
- **Economics** – Looks at the bigger picture and tries to predict what external influences may impact on the business.

The growing popularity of Junior Commerce continued in 2021, with a record number of Year 9 and 10 students choosing to learn about all things finance. The first semester Year 9 Enterprise group succeeded in running the largest Market Day for a number of years despite inclement weather. Unfortunately, Covid stopped the second semester Market Day and the final of Year 10 Commerce's Business Innovation Challenge. However, classes from both year levels had the chance to trial the financial literacy package 'MoneyTime'; an exciting development the department will look to extend in 2022.

In the senior school, the highlight for the year was the success in the Young Enterprise Scheme, run in Year 13 Business and Entrepreneurial Studies. Three teams (out of eight) qualified for the regional finals. The eventual regional runners up were Monthly Collective (Esme Thomas, Millie Baker, Pippa Richards), who produced a subscription box



of sustainable period products and essentials. Winning the Innovation Award at the same event was Joosh (Jack Nielsen, Heidi Adams), with a health beneficial juice/smoothie powder. Winning a commitment to Business Award was Puppads.nz (Ash White), with an innovative idea to fix the issue around puppy pee pads that do not decompose.

Though much of the Business and Entrepreneurial Centre's programmes were put on hold due to Covid, two initiatives did get up and running. In Term 1, guest entrepreneur, Andrew Patterson ran a term long Share Market course, introducing students to fundamental and technical analysis of shares. In 2022, the BEC will build on this course by offering a weekly Sharesies Club. In Term 2 and 3, the regular Dragons' Den competition was run. After six workshops, students were prepared to pitch their ideas to guest judges, however; two days before the final the Level 4 lockdown was called and the final was postponed to 2022.

After 2020, the long and difficult year that was 2021 drew to its welcome close. Head of Faculty Andrew Maunder acknowledges the tireless efforts of Commerce teachers Chris MacLeod, Sam Wakerley, Margaret Welsh, and Wesley Augustus and thanks them for their dedication to the commerce students. Additionally, he would also like to thank the faculty's students. The fortitude and positivity in which they approached interruptions to their learning has been exemplary.

"I'm really big on using the combination of phones-laptops-google classroom-google slides. Students can do any kind of practical (take a photo or screenshot of it) or written work and put it directly onto the same document that the instructions are on.

I chose this because I use it all the time and it makes a number of things clearer and easier to manage for both me and the students.

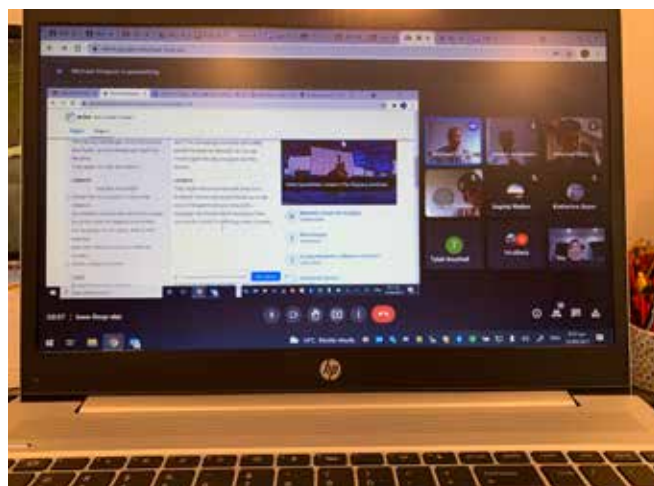
The students benefit as they are less likely to miss instructions as there is consistency with the routines of doing classwork. They also don't lose their work and are able to get feedback without physically having to raise their hand."

"As most students bring a laptop I can differentiate in most lessons in Y9 – Y11 Maths. I always use a PowerPoint (besides oral explanation it also becomes visual) where I start with a visual 'brainsnack' (puzzle) and most lessons students can choose between set work from the book, TRANSUM (Maths Topics (transum.org)) and/or Education Perfect. These last two are easy to use for staff and students and student's work is being marked for them - they get feedback straight

away. I also use Google classroom as a digital library (notes/ PPP/ practice tests/ exam papers/ logbooks/ video links/...) and Geogebra to demonstrate geometric and/or graph properties to make theory visual."

Online learning has made the shift to elearning and is starting to impact teaching across all areas of the school.

Digital Technology

A big feature of 2021 was Game Development. A couple of lockdown sessions meant the hardware had to be put away for a while and gave some classes extra opportunity to work on their coding, media, and visual design skills. The online platform Gamefroot was used in a number of classes and was great for managing online learning and collaboration. Platformers and top-down role playing games were popular and students' imaginations went into overdrive.

Year 13 NCEA students also decided to develop a game for their group project with all scratch-built 3D models. Considerable testing went into making their platformer game as fun as possible.

Year 12 students designed and created networks for hosting multiplayer gaming, and Year 11 students all did individual game development projects during the year as well. This theme carried right across the senior assessment regime.

A new initiative this year came in at the Year 7, where all students got the opportunity to work with the Ozobot brand of educational robots. Many fun tracks and maps were drawn for these robots to play in, traverse, and race each other. Students also hand crafted their own robot intelligences to download into them.

Enhanced Learning

The Enhanced Learning (EL) team have once again grown and strengthened as they flexed to meet the new challenges and demands of learning in 2021. Developing strong connections and effective working relationships with learners is always the priority for the team of Learning Assistants (LAs). There is no doubt this pays off in classrooms, and perhaps even more so when learning moves online. Building upon the experiences of 2020, the team moved smoothly between platforms as and when needed and continue to enjoy supporting learners with the challenges of learning.

A team of up to 17 Learning Assistants and two Enhanced Learning teachers have worked throughout the school in 2021, supporting classroom and specialist teachers across the curriculum. The school continues to be incredibly fortunate in the quality and capabilities each LA brings. The 2021 LA team has a range of backgrounds, and varied life experiences. More than half have degree qualifications, and seven are fully qualified teachers. The diversity of the team is a real strength, and their continued commitment to learners is second to none.

"You explain things different. You break it down for us and talk us through it. We create a bond which helps us feel confident to talk and answer questions. If we ask you, we don't feel stink about asking again if we still don't understand."

Alongside the work to ensure curriculum content is well understood, LAs continue to focus on strengthening every learner's independence by helping them develop a sense of how they learn best. Because they are all unique, the way they learn is too. While some students find success in using traditional text-based methods to learn, others flourish when material is presented orally, and with time to talk and collaborate with others as they practice. There really is no one right way!

With the goal of strengthening learner competence and confidence, the team ran a trial with a group of Year 11 students this year. The students – identified and supported by their core teachers, Deans, and parents – took a reduced subject-load, allowing a timetable line with the EL team. During the EL line, students were supported to practice, apply, and develop deeper understandings of the content they were engaging with in classes. It has been incredibly rewarding to see this group of learners not only achieving well, but also strengthening their confidence as highly capable learners. The success of this trial has seen the team already planning for on-going work into 2022.

"I can take my time. I can work to my best. The LAs are right there with us. They give us examples and make it easier by showing us how they would do it. I am achieving those higher marks."

Providing fair access to assessment for all students also continues to be a key piece of work for the EL team. This is achieved through the provision of Special Assessment Conditions (SACs). From Year 11, formal applications are made to NZQA who consider evidence provided and approve the conditions that may be needed for a student to demonstrate their capabilities. SACs remove barriers - sensory, physical, medical, or learning-related - are only provided for capable students, who show they are working at the expected levels of curriculum.

The Enhanced Learning team is well named, with all the core business of the team focused on enhancing the learning of ALL students, seeing them develop as life-long learners, and achieve to the very best of their ability.

Equine Studies

2021 was a busy year in Equine Studies. The classes were able to tour around Equibreed, the leading equine breeding facility. Here students were able to look through state of the art microscopes to see a range of embryos at different stages of development, see a mare scanned and in foal, and learn to judge the quality of individual male and female gametes under microscope.

Across the Year 9, 10 and senior classes, courses covered a range of theory including:

- signs of a healthy and unhealthy horse
- horse-safe grasses, fencing and gates
- New Zealand's Animal Welfare Act
- managing worm burden in horses and properties
- equine behaviour and wild horse populations
- conformation and lameness
- fitness and strengthening for riders
- muscular and skeletal systems and body parts
- grooming for competition

Between wintery weather and lockdowns all students still managed to experience a number of practical sessions on:

- massage
- clipping
- lunging
- taking vital signs
- documenting the arrival of horses at an equine facility
- identification of lameness

A highlight for the Equine Studies programme this year was the opportunity to follow the pregnancy of St Peter's wry nose mare, Rhino. Students learned about the developmental stages of a foal prior to birth, how to prepare for foaling, a range of knowledge around breeding, how to tell when a mare is ready to foal. Students drew with chalk on Rhino's side, showing the position of her foal and skeleton, reinforcing their theory in a hands-on way.

Fashion Technology

This year the Fashion Design classroom had a great mix of teachers to aid the development of a range of assignments. Year 7s and 8s were introduced to the basics of sewing and the processes of technology, constructing snakes and pyjama shorts with a reusable bag. Year 9s learnt how basic measurements can impact a final outcome when designing and creating a patchwork quilt. They were able to create their own patterns and work out a logical order to ensure the correct construction. They also learnt technical skills on the overlocker by making hoodies. Year 10s started the year creating kimono robes in linens and cottons, then extended their technical skills using satin and piping to construct a pyjama set for summer or winter.

Seniors spent the year working through two assessments. For the first assignment, Year 13 students had the opportunity to investigate a range of textile techniques and textures to develop a wall hanging. This was inspired by a photograph and transformed into a 3D or layered form. Year 12s focused on advanced construction of special features including on-trend cargo pockets, denim, jumpsuits and corduroy. Year 11s learnt special skills in elements of design and the way fashion designers use these to compliment the body.

For the major project, seniors used NCEA achievement standards as a way to explore concepts of their choice, through the technology process. This year they worked with the teacher to create individual briefs to guide and develop a garment/outfit fit for its intended purpose. A major portion of this design work is spent testing and researching to justify its suitability. Year 13 students were able to choose a client to work with and created loungewear for up and coming clothing labels/stores, farm overalls, florist aprons, children's tracksuits, a graduation outfit, and sustainable casualwear using offcuts donated by Moochi.

Year 12 students were inspired by the festival scene. A mixture of bright, patterned, loose and fitted clothing was created to help give individuality and flare for the upcoming summer season. Year 11s created a range of pants, dresses, t-shirts and jumpsuits. They were able to make mock ups of their design, fit it to the body and adapt the fit using basic pattern making skills. The year was finished with a final written report looking into risk management. A huge thank you to Caitie Simpson for her enthusiasm and motivation towards students while covering a maternity leave position.

Food Technology

Food Technology and Food and Nutrition continue to be very popular throughout junior and senior school. Junior Food follows the department's philosophy of learning through practical experience.

Topics in Year 9 include: food safety, healthy plate, and creative baking. The healthy plate unit involves students learning about meal planning and the importance of eating whole foods and seasonal produce. Using planning tools, the students plan and prepare a pasta meal that includes food from the four food groups and a substantial serving of a colourful, seasonal vegetable. This is an assessed unit that all of the students enjoy. During the autumn, Year 9 enjoyed participating in seasonal food research, finding the benefits of eating food in season and studying how to use money wisely, being sustainable and producing material relating to their research.

The Year 10 programme continues with the theme of gaining practical experience, whilst learning about diet-related wellbeing. The burger competition was successful again this year. The students were able to be creative in designing and creating a healthy and nutritious meal using a burger.

New this year was the heritage morning tea, teaching students the importance of family connection for social wellbeing. Students prepared a variety of recipes, then faced the challenge of creating their family recipe that met the requirements of the given brief.

Seniors have spent the year working through a range of standards, with two main assessments.

Level 1 students concentrated their studies on nutrition for an individual's wellbeing. With a positive attitude and outcome, students were able to produce healthy, balanced meals and prepare a variety of recipes.

Level 2 students studied food sustainability, advanced procedures in food, creating a range of pastry-based outcomes, and nutritional issues related to New Zealand standards.

Level 3 students spent the first part of the year implementing complex procedures in a range of dishes. They studied ethical dilemmas related to New Zealand food supply and then created an action plan.

Barista training was once again offered to Year 12 and 13 Food Technology students. Neville Morgan from Espresso Stuff conducted the workshop, where students undertook training, making a range of coffees under supervision, which go towards the Level 2 Barista Certificate.

Junior Sports Academies

The purpose of the Year 9 and 10 Junior Sports Academies is to ensure quality sports experiences and learning through the Sport development pathway, and to support St Peter's students in reaching their goals through a balanced approach to sport wellbeing. The Academies have seen growth this year, with the numbers in netball and football increasing to 27 and 31 students respectively, and a further increase in numbers for 2022.

This course is for students who are striving to improve and compete in rugby, netball, football, hockey or cricket during their time at St Peter's. The course offers students a unique opportunity to develop both physical and mental sport-specific skills under the tuition of experienced coaches and players. Enrolment in this course will see students receive expert guidance specific to rugby, netball, football, hockey or cricket, such as: individual core skills, game understanding, and sport-specific conditioning over the course of a year.

Desired outcomes/pathway

The Junior Academy system is designed to ensure all players reach their full potential in their chosen sport and this may have varying levels of achievement. The school's aim is to see students' progress into:

- junior and senior St Peter's sports teams
- opportunity to travel and play in sports exchanges both here and overseas
- regional and national age group teams.

Development of depth and foundations in each sport that leads to:

- a culture of competition and excellence in the St Peter's sports programme
- a possible career path or life-long involvement in sport beyond school.

A feature of this has been the number of students progressing into representative teams for the 2021 season in their respective sports. This in turn will grow the base of the student's skillsets.

In this fifth year of running Junior Sports Academies, the sports department faced the significant challenge of keeping players engaged and fit over the lockdown period. Coaches met this challenge by providing athletes with training programmes and goals. The weekly circuits, time trials, video clips, zoom calls, and goals were well received. Students responded well by sending feedback and photos of their training at home.

The highlight this year was the Year 9 and 10 netball, rugby, cricket, hockey and football Sports Academies' trip to Mt Maunganui in March for their Beach Challenge Day. Over 176 students participated in a variety of challenges including a Mount run, strength and conditioning, water-based relays and problem-solving. The focus was on embracing challenges, supporting each other and learning to train in different environments. The afternoon consisted of mixed-sports where the four academies were mixed to play modified netball, football, and touch. This was a great example of cross-codes working together with staff, students and coaches benefiting from the day's activities.

The guiding principles in sport are from the St Peter's founder, Mr Arthur Broadhurst, his aim was to educate the whole person and grow good people by focusing on the mind, body and spirit. This is applicable to the St Peter's junior sports academies as it reflects their focus when preparing athletes to compete in wider arenas.

Junior Cricket Academy

The Cricket Academy has had another successful year with player development in an athlete-centred environment. This year has seen two groups at the Academy, which has enabled a more individualised approach for each player. Academy sessions were based at the Cricket Pavilion, Horton Gym, and the oval - along with online learning during lockdown. The Pavilion is the iconic home of cricket at St Peter's and Academy students are continuously immersed in the history and traditions of the game within the school.

The lockdown in Term 3 and the beginning of Term 4 enabled students to challenge themselves and be creative. During the lockdown cricketers were set a range of challenges, which included: "do it yourself" at home drills, challenges set between the players, and a history of cricket inquiry.

The Cricket Academy programme caters to the unique needs for each individual athlete, whilst developing under the four pillars of physical, psychological, tactical, and enjoyment. Within this, students focused on technical and tactical development, mental awareness, and physical development. Throughout the year, modules included: leadership, mental skills, resilience, and game strategic planning. Each member created their own performance plan, which included goal setting and an action plan moving forward.

The year included a comprehensive and structured strength and conditioning programme, which was led by trainer Mr Todd Barker. The skills, understanding of the game, and fitness of all Academy members has developed over the year. All Academy students contributed well to the overall success of junior cricket.

A special mention goes to Year 10 Academy member Xavier Bell, who was selected to be part of the Northern Districts Academy programme.

Junior Football Academy

The Football Academy has grown in numbers in 2021, with the highest participation numbers to date. The Academy continues to develop students under the St Peter's Football DNA; helping the continued understanding of the football culture while underpinned by the school's values.

The Academy covered a wide range of curriculum: goal setting, strength and conditioning, injury prevention, game analysis, coaching workshop, technical and tactical game understanding, and much more. The Football Academy is perfect for the aspiring footballer as it is a curriculum option.

Regular fitness screening is conducted through the strength and conditioning staff, who monitor player welfare to ensure players are not overloaded and that they can perform at their best throughout the season.

During Term 4, the Academy enjoyed some cross-code training and used the pool as part of strength and conditioning. A big thank you must go to St Peter's Strength and conditioning Coach Todd Barker, who has fantastic input into the Football Academy.

Junior Netball Academy

The Netball Academy is a unique opportunity to grow the individual netballer and assist with learning the basic to advanced skills of the game. Many players come into this programme having not been in an academy programme before, therefore the skill levels will vary. As a coach the aim is to provide guidance to all athletes to enable them to reach their potential either at participant or competitive levels.

The players are encouraged to reflect on their game, apply skills in match play, execute what is required in competition, and refine skills to advance understanding for future development. This season saw the coronavirus disrupt the programme once again, reducing class time and the flow-on effect of a compromised match programme.

The important component for any individual player is their own commitment to their learning by making the most of strength and conditioning, nutrition and group communication skills. In a team game, how you work together is important for the good of all, and necessary in tactical play. During lockdown it was pleasing to see Academy players respond to the challenges and skill work on training programmes sent by Celine Selwyn.

The benefits of the Academy are coming through in the senior players with Year 10 player Jess Jennings showing her ability and transitioning into the Premier team, matching the skill of the older players. The physical skills and training are complemented by the mental skills necessary to perform at that level.

The numbers in the Academy classes have increased and bolster the playing base for 2021; 29 in Year 9 and 19 in Year 10, which is great for netball at St Peter's.

Both Academy groups this year have given their best and adapted to achieve well with their introduction to the Netball Umpiring Award. All Year 9 Academy students have passed the online written exam. This will hold the school in good stead with umpiring in the future.

Coaches always look objectively at what has been achieved and strive to improve the curriculum. They are very proud of the results of the Academy athletes over the past season and look forward to working with a new cohort in the coming year.

Junior Rugby Academy

The focus of the Rugby Academy has remained the same since it first started. The programme covers physical, mental, technical/tactical, and cultural aspects as its four key pillars; aligned with New Zealand Rugby. This focus targets the development of players both on and off the field.

Academy sessions at all levels focus on developing fundamental skill sets and physical attributes needed for rugby, whilst instilling a sense of fun and enjoyment in the student's chosen sport. This is a great option for aspiring young rugby players, as it is a curriculum option.

As well as on-field skill sessions with Mr Carl Perry, the students also take part in regular strength and conditioning sessions with Mr Todd Barker. Through the ongoing fitness screening of these young men, results show that it produces harder working, better educated, and better prepared young athletes.

During Term 4, the focus of both the Year 9 and 10 classes was established by the students. The common goal was to continue improving fitness levels, catch and pass skills, and to develop the class culture. Small changes led to huge improvements and saw a real team vibe established among the group.

Another positive aspect of Term 4 was that students were able to enjoy cross-code training with a variety of other Academies, which also helps build strong relationships within the school community.

Languages

Many years ago, the New Zealand Herald ran an article labelled “Bilingualism good for the brain” and went on to detail how operating in two languages slows mental ageing. At St Peter’s, students continue to have many options of how they can slow their mental ageing! They can choose from French, Spanish, Japanese, Chinese, Te Reo Māori and English as an Additional Language. The two newest languages on offer at St Peter’s, Chinese and Spanish, have expanded the offer this year to include Year 11 NCEA Level 1 Spanish, Year 12 NCEA Level 2 Chinese, and the first year of the IB Diploma.

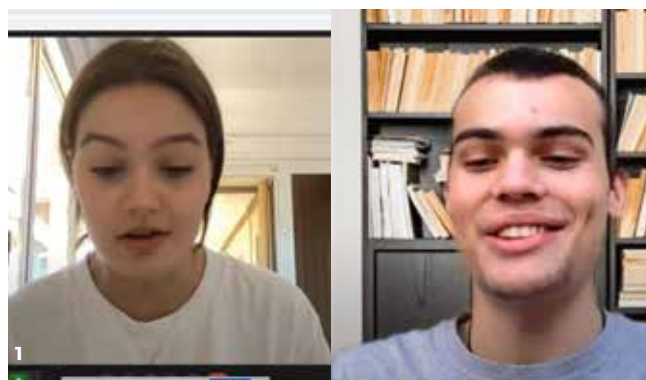
Being able to communicate, being able to connect with others is the core principle that sits behind all that this faculty does. Again, all language students, both at junior and senior level, demonstrated their capacity to learn their chosen language in any situation, whether in a virtual or face-to-face learning environment. Activities ranged from online quizzes, conversations and speeches, to the more traditional face-to-face learning.

All Year 13 IB students completed their IB speaking assessments using google meet with their class teachers, due to the lockdown occurring at the same time. Thankfully, having had plenty of experience by this point on how to make online learning successful, these assessments were really just the next step in this digital pathway that students and teachers have been walking in recent times.

Once the school reopened after lockdown, many students were still unable to return, so teachers continued to assist the learning process by maintaining hybrid lessons, with some joining the physical classroom via their digital platform.

Language learning opportunities within New Zealand are much more accessible for all students. That is why all were especially grateful that they could run at least one event despite lockdowns – Year 12 IB French students visited the Café le Rendezvous for a French speaking challenge combined with galettes and crepes, served by the café owner who is also French!

In 2021, the Languages Faculty welcomed back Mrs Duran as teacher of Spanish and were pleased to have Mr McIntosh join as teacher of Chinese. Mrs Fuller continues as Director of International Students, supporting the Faculty as Head of EAL. Mr Welsh continues to teach Japanese. Teaching French and Spanish to a senior level, Ms Verriere has also continued to support students studying languages via Te Aho o Te Kura Pounamu / The Correspondence School.

Library and Information Centre

One of the talented Library students, Jesse Clarke, wrote and had published a graphic novel *Mr Kiwileaf 1*. Jesse has created a very special book with wonderful hand drawn pictures in it. He kindly donated a copy of his amazing book to the Library for other keen readers to enjoy.

The return of Covid and lockdown impacted hugely on our book quiz competition activities. The High School Lit quiz was postponed indefinitely. The Prep Lit Quiz team of Hannah Deverall, Alex Coley, Lucy Coley and Victoria Coley performed brilliantly, winning the Waikato regional heat of the Kids' Lit Quiz in May. They answered a range of literary questions on such topics as dreams, elephants, flames, talking animals, treasure, and symbols. The final of the competition was due to be held in Wellington later on in the year but was postponed due to Covid restrictions. This was very disappointing for the team with all the hard work they had put into preparing for the competition.

During the lockdowns the Library ran a number of online reading activities for the junior students. The 'Reading in Unusual Places' photo competition was very successful with numerous entries from students reading in unusual or strange places. The winner of the competition judged by Mr Hohneck was Year 8 student Neve Watkins with her stunning rural reading photo.

The amazing Student Librarian Team, comprising of 32 students from Years 7-13, have done a superb job of assisting in the Library with a range of tasks. Some Duke of Edinburgh students have completed service work in the Library and were tasked with the responsibility of putting the books in order on the shelves. All this student participation in running the Library is greatly appreciated and it is awesome seeing so many students enjoying helping the Library staff.

Mathematics

The Mathematics and Statistics Faculty through 2021 has continued the innovative delivery of this curriculum area; supporting students in a subject which many pathways after high school require formal qualifications in.

Through this last year the IB programme changes implemented in the previous year have continued to be strengthened and developed by the school's teachers. Over the next year at least two further teachers will undergo training to be able to deliver the IB curriculum. The changes to NCEA subjects over the next few years will have a massive impact on this subject area. Even though some of the changes will not be fully implemented until 2026 planning and thinking is underway for these changes. They offer challenges but immense opportunity also. In the immediate future changes to the formal Numeracy qualification will see St Peter's as a trial school for the Numeracy test, which our Year 10s will do in 2022. This test, run online, will assess students' capabilities to apply and reason across strands of mathematics and statistics, based on real life contexts. It will be a co-requisite to gaining formal NCEA qualifications in the future.

In 2021 eight students entered in Scholarship Calculus or Statistics programmes. The faculty hopes to build on the success of the two statistics scholarships from 2020. Special

mention must go to Taryn Sundararaj and Sara Cao who completed the year-long MATH199 University of Canterbury engineering mathematics paper, both gaining an A+. The course is equivalent to two full papers and the content covers in depth mathematics that helps prepares students for formal 2nd year engineering courses. Both students completed this in their own time along with their other school subjects.

The WaiMaths competition in August managed to beat the national lockdown by one week. Teams were entered from Year 7 to 11. The Year 9 team won the competition for the first time in 13 years. A magnificent effort against some high-quality opposition.

Henk Bertelink, Debbie Heard and Sarah Dawson joined the Mathematics Faculty in the year and have settled in quickly. They bring a wealth of experience from overseas and New Zealand and have worked tremendously hard to support all St Peter's students.

Media Studies

Year 13

Year 13 students dusted off the cobwebs of summer by getting the creative juices flowing. Groups were established and the roles of a script writer, cinematographer, editor and audio engineer were divvied up amongst them. Genre's ranged from a coming of age story, a thriller and a horror. Two stand out films were produced, "Him" and "As above, so below".

They continued with a study of David Fincher's *Gone Girl*, with many students in the room left questioning their own perception of each other following the plot twists and unreliable narration of the main character, Amy. Things took a quick turn to explore the development and impact online streaming services like Netflix and Disney+ are having on the television and film industries, before the year finished with a blood-chilling examination of the slasher genre and the American society of the 1970s-80s. Students explored how divorce rates and serial killings spiked, society lost trust in their government, and how the genre took inspiration from this to create the unstoppable masked killer, punish the sins of ineffectual parents and how one lone final girl survived this tumultuous cautionary tale.

Year 12

The Year 12s started with an enthusiastic narrative study of the 2016 hit Netflix series *Stranger Things*. 1980s sentiment and nostalgia were felt (mostly by Mr Vesseur) as together they explored how the innocence of childhood, the coming of age tale of teenagers and the complexities of adulthood were all expertly crafted and intertwined using various narrative conventions. This was very quickly followed with the opportunity for students to write and produce their own character webisode for an upcoming television series involving the mysterious blackmail syndicate and a game of truth, dare or promise, that was being operated at St Peter's. Students learnt the complexities, team-work and problem solving skills that are needed to create a film. Some chose to forgo this experience in favour of creating a feature magazine article.

They say if you want someone to pay attention, make them fearful... We took this to new extremes by ending the year with some frights, thrills and lots of laughter in the Slasher genre study. Students explored the roots of the genre and tracked its evolution through its heyday in the 70s/80s, to its meta-rebirth in the 90s, and the reboots and deconstruction in the 2000s, all while trying to please both new and old audiences.

Year 11

This year's Year 11 cohort was the first to have come with a background in media, having completed the Year 10 course last year, and the benefits of this foundation were evident early on, with students creating an outstanding edit of a horror scene. The first internal started with a good old coming of age story. Students analysed Stephen Chbosky's screen-adaptation of 'The Perks of Being a Wallflower' – about a troubled teenage boy navigating his way through his first year of high school. Following this, focus quickly shifted to their first creative assessment; a script. Students took inspiration from a poem or song and wrote a script that drew from the imagery and symbolism of this primary text. Term 2 took this cohort on a journey to study the most successful genre of the 21st Century – The Superhero genre. With laser

vision, flight, fantastic technology and some heroic qualities, students gained insight into the fundamental characteristics of the genre and how they've contributed to its success. The year finished with students writing a second script and creating a short film. Unfortunately, these were significantly disrupted by the lockdowns, and many chose to create a "day in the life" vlog during lockdown, which shared the multi-faceted and interestingly different lives our students all live.

Year 10

The latest crop of Year 10 Media students started the year bright eyed and bushy tailed. They launched into the basics of media studies seeking to answer the fundamental questions of any media student: what are media studies, why is it important, and what have I signed up for? These questions and more were explored in the media concepts phase of the course, which ended with students making a video essay on a chosen social activism hashtag.

We then dove deep in the recesses of the mind with a film study of Christopher Nolan's *Inception*. Many students were lost in limbo, but some managed to grasp its complicated

ideas. They then switched gears, spaceships and planets, to a study of the Space Opera genre (no not the singing kind), studying all things intergalactic, stretching the bounds of reality and exploring “where no man has gone before”. Students then combined this knowledge with some creative design skills to make a magazine on the genre. Finally, the year wrapped up with a short film festival, with students creating a 1-minute short film that involved one problem and one location. Overall, it was a great introduction to what media is, and students gained some insight into what makes the media world tick... or tok.



International Baccalaureate Film

Due to a reduction in numbers, the Year 2 IB students combined with the Year 12 Media course in a conjoined class. Students continued to build on the foundations laid in Year 1, with the first assessment focussing on completing their comparative study of two films across time, space and/or culture. Richard chose to do an impressive comparison of Sidney Lumet's 1957 classic *12 Angry Men* to Ang Xu's 2015 remake *12 Citizens* set in China, while Rory chose to compare two films from the Kaiju genre, Ishiro Honda's 1954 classic



Godzilla, and Gareth Edward's 2014 reboot of the same name.

Following this assessment, students then turned their attention toward the monumental task of assembling and finishing their film portfolio which is the culmination of two years' work and creating a short film. The experimentation, ideas, and execution saw students pushed to the limit of their skill-set to produce two truly outstanding portfolios. Overall, both Rory and Richard can be proud of their journey across the past two years and take solace and pride when reflecting on the work they have produced during this time.

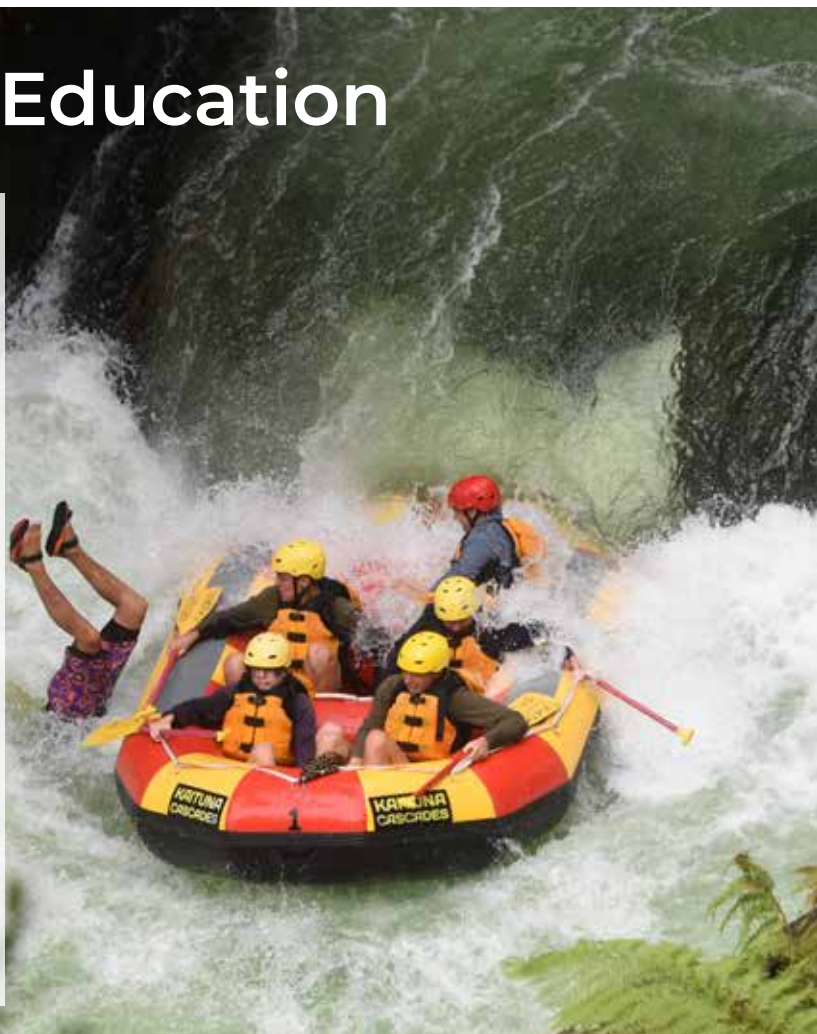
Outdoor Education

The course provided students an opportunity to explore a range of challenging activities and environments. These activities enhanced interpersonal skills such as co-operation, decision making, and leadership.

- Padi Scuba diving open water dive licence.
- Rafting the Wairoa River.



Performing Arts

The current Covid pandemic has been enough to daunt even the strongest of us. Online learning came to the forefront for a second year and for a practical subject like dance this posed some interesting challenges. Nonetheless, students continued their learning; showing their resilience and motivation. Dance has never been more important than in a time like today. It has a unique power and serves as a useful vehicle of hope and positivity for students, which attempts to bring relief into a world that could be perceived as struggling under a huge cloud of uncertainty. St Peter's students continued to dance through the screen, and used the freedom of movement to express themselves, despite the unexpected challenges they faced.

During the first term, the Year 9 dance students were introduced to jazz technique through a group performance. The focus of this unit was to improve ensemble awareness and refine performance principals such as execution of technique and emotional expression. Students spent time exploring the dance elements through a range of choreographic activities, which prepared them for their group choreography assessment, based on the stimulus of Kowhaiwhai patterns. Year 10 dance students were introduced to a traditional Philippine folk dance Tinikling and contemporary technique through an athletic performance that was presented in the Aspire Dance Showcase. The large increase in students selecting dance as an option this year has enabled the subject to grow with students finding an appreciation and understanding of its place in their education and life beyond school.

Choreographic processes, performance principles, and analytical reflection are the three main areas the senior dance students continue to develop throughout the year. A highlight for these students was the annual Dance Camp in Raglan, where the students welcomed external tutors Kelsey Andrew, (owner and director of KJ Studios) and Abby Dutton, (owner and director of Studio Glow). The weekend consisted of improving technique and performance principles to prepare them for the learning of their assessment pieces. The camp helped these students grow technically as dancers but also strengthened peer relationships which is equally important.

Throughout the year, the students are introduced to external tutors in order to grow their experiences with different teachers. The Year 13 dance students were fortunate enough to learn a repertoire contemporary piece from Matthew Roffe, professional dancer/performer and past Australian Dance Theatre company member. The Year 12 NCEA and IB dance students learnt an ethnic dance to grow their knowledge around different dance cultures and experience different dance styles. The students welcomed Otis Herring, professional dancer and choreographer, into the studio. He passed on his knowledge and choreography of traditional African dance.

"Being a part of the St Peter's dance community has been an influential and immense part of my time at St Peter's over the past four years and a journey at that. Junior Drama students continue to develop their skills in a fun and engaging environment; one that invites them to leave their inhibitions at the door and explore different ways in which they can grow as a performer. Venturing into the world of *Harry Potter* and *The Sims* has allowed the students to consider characterisation, working collaboratively, and ultimately producing performance skills which they will carry through with them.

2021 has provided many opportunities for young performers; exploring a range of different theatre styles and practical applications within Drama. This has involved viewing a number of live performances such as *Dakota of the White Flats*, *The Young and Hungry Tour*, as well as a trip to ASB Theatre in Auckland to see *The Life of Galileo*.

Year 11 students worked closely with Mrs Katie Hansen to produce an outstanding performance of *Fantastic Mr Fox*. This featured some very cleverly put together animal outfits as well as a lot of hard work from those behind the scenes. As always, it was great to see the characterisations

and confidence of these performers. The Year 12 students produced a show which allowed for characters to seamlessly swap, and for some stage trickery to believe that George's Marvellous Medicine had indeed taken hold.

The Level 3 Production of *The Outsiders* finished mere hours before Waikato was once again thrust into a lockdown. This was particularly significant for all the hard work that the Year 13 and IB Theatre students had put in to make this a successful show. Never underestimate how much it takes to bring something like this to life. For directors Ella Veitch and Felix Rowe, this will be an experience that all involved will be remembered for a long time.

Mrs Renate O'Sullivan was farewelled this year, after seven years at St Peter's. Renate worked tirelessly in the Drama department, providing amazing opportunities and experiences for all St Peter's students.



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Curriculum Music

The Junior Music programme continues to allow St Peter's learners to develop fundamental skills in music, as well as allowing these students to recognise their own pathways and involvement in the Performing Arts. Opportunities to work in groups builds communication skills, recognising the strengths of each person and a drive towards a common goal.

This was notable in Year 10 Music, where learners were required to select a New Zealand artist and create a twist on a popular hit. This was a two part process. An arrangement allowed students to discover how different elements of music can be manipulated to create a new and original sound to an existing song, as well as learning how to rehearse and perform this in a confident manner. Further work throughout the year aimed to build a strong knowledge and understanding of musical concepts through the study of a broad range of music. This includes genres such as Film Music, Classical Music, Blues Music, and Computer Sequenced Music. As these learners move through the Junior programme, they are encouraged to develop a self-reliance and love for their craft.

Senior Music programmes highlight the diverse range of musicians at St Peter's; encouraging a broad range of musical opportunities which allow depth to be built in both knowledge and performance skills. With both the Music and Music Technology pathways being open to students, it is incredibly encouraging to see the collaborative nature, and the students work towards group performances, song writing and recording experiences. Studies of works such as Gustav Holst's *The Planets*, George Gershwin's *Rhapsody in Blue*, and NZ Composer Claire Cowen's *Ultra Violet*, continue to provide the greater context in which music informs lives and the role it plays in society. 2022 has shown a high level of performance skill and readiness from the school's musicians; working through challenging situations and the preparedness to craft and refine to present themselves in a professional conduct on the stage.

It is pleasing to see that a number of students who are leaving St Peter's, will further engage with Music as part of their tertiary studies, a testament to their own contribution and commitment in this space.

Product Design - Metal and Wood

Metal

A new year in the Product Design – Metal class started with enthusiasm from students, filled with ideas and plans to create their ultimate project in the workshop in 2021.

Ideas ranged: go-karts, mini bikes, pneumatic can crushers, tensegrity tables, pizza ovens, weight stations, bike trailers, bike/bicycle service stands, and barbecues, to mention a few. Students were encouraged to use and hone in on their skills in the workshop to look at every possible option and solution to complete their project within the timeframe given.

Gantt charts, material costing, and parts lists were utilised to assist them with their planning. Sketchup was mainly used for idea generation, where they modelled their final project. Students incorporated a variety of tools and equipment with every project manufactured, (lathe, milling, plasma cutting, fabrication, Mig, Tig, and Gas welding). The junior students manufactured military style dog tags, animal desk tidies, pewter pendants with gift boxes, brass hammers, and portable barbecues. Every year level made use of different hand tools, equipment, and machinery throughout the different stages of their work.

Senior students had to focus on how modelling techniques could assist them with risk management whilst constructing their project. All Year 11 to 13 students started with a smaller project as part of their skill developing following a specific design brief. These included projects from mild steel and wood, where shelves, small tables, and benches were made. Major individual projects were completed applying advanced and complex procedures following the necessary Health and Safety protocols within the workshop.

Wood

Junior groups experienced a range of traditional and modern workshop techniques. Year 7 created laser cut clocks and floating shelves, whilst Year 9 created a personalised laser engraved seat. Learning to read working drawings and programme CAD/CAM software, juniors have excelled at the potential that this technology can offer future ideas.

Gaming tables have proven popular with Year 10 students, and have allowed them to become familiar with a range of hand and machine tools, whilst working towards their health and safety competence level. Using a traditional technique of laminating timbers, the group have worked with a plethora of new lumbers with different working properties.

Level 1 students have explored a multitude of ways to address this year's design brief: Students' work stations. How apt as there was ample time to test them out and provide feedback. Student accommodation can be cluttered. Finding a creative and functional way of organising and storing personal items and sports gear have proven to be a challenge. This year's group also saw an increase in female students in the workshop environment and they have risen to the standard to prove 'girls are just as good as the boys!' Whilst being relatively new to the workshop, most Year 11 students have used a range of machines to produce professional and functional desks and tables including hall tables, dressing tables, folding up and complete flat packed desks.

Level 2 students were challenged with manufacturing drawers that were to be functional and would become a feature as their main furniture item. Drawers can be technical and require at least three different traditional joining methods, avoiding the easiest temptation to screw or nail them together.

At Level 2 the quality of manufacture outweighs the size of their product. Whilst using an array of machines, the arrival of a new dovetail jig helped to improve productivity and profession as to a higher degree. It is important to make sure the joints are tight, square, and strong. Testing and trialling allowed the group to improve their final outcomes. One student has taken their development to the next level, making a 'bowtie' joint: a variant of the more traditional tenon and mortise joint, a skill that will open tertiary education doors for him. This year has seen a mix of materials introduced including salusalu, Fijian kauri, and reclaimed rimu timber, as well as mirrored acrylic Perspex, resin inlays, and hollow steel framing, and even hand-felled totara from the Taranaki.

Level 3 ventured further in to Computer Numerical Control (CNC), Computer Aided Design and Manufacture (CAD/CAM). This level of experience is ideal for students to get a flavour of what life in industry and the workplace could be like. The CAD process introduced students to a professional software that is used in universities and schools globally. This year the

group completed the process totally unaided; laser cutting and engraving a range of materials, including birch ply and Perspex acrylic. From start to finish students designed and programmed the \$15k machine solo. A daunting experience, but one that they were able to reflect on and aim to perfect, ready to apply new laser engraved designs to their major end of year project.

Major projects each had a 'live' client whose opinion shaped the development of students' ideas and outcomes. Extensive testing, research, and experimentation has helped one student create steam bent bar stool legs. Their success has helped pave the way for future steam bending within the department - watch this space!

Physical Education and Health

In 2021 the Physical Education and Health Faculty has been working towards meeting the school's goals. The team had a tough year with the impacts of online learning (challenging for physical education lessons), but found creative and innovative ways to engage students. The faculty continued the implementation of the Physical Education and Health programme from Year 7-13, ensuring the health programme was in-depth and covering a large range of topics. Staff looked to refine and improve the opportunities for all students, by ensuring the delivery of lessons in an innovative and creative way throughout the year.

The need to have a PE and Health curriculum for all students in this day and age is crucial with the constant change in societal trends.

Highlights for the year

- Health Level 2 was introduced for the first time.
- Hockey Turf was upgraded to a water turf.
- Year 7 and 9 students had the opportunity to have golf sessions at the school driving range with the golf staff.
- Year 8 and 10 students had the opportunity to try track cycling at the Avantidrome.
- For senior NCEA students there was the Year 11 PE camp in Rotorua, the Year 12s sailed on Steinlager Two, and Year 13 participated in a Tough Guy/Gal event.

The Physical Education and Health Faculty is fortunate to have amazing facilities and students who are keen and eager to engage in their lessons. Staff are dedicated to improving the programme and utilise students voices.

Health- NCEA

This year has been a fantastic year for Health Studies at St Peter's. 2021 has seen the second year a Level 1 Health class has run and an inaugural Level 2 Health class. Both year levels have covered valuable and relevant content throughout the year, with highlights including the Level 1 students analysing the factors that impact people's ability to be resilient, as well as developing their own assertive communication when resolving conflict. The Level 2 class worked collaboratively to identify issues within the St Peter's school community and organise events for Health Promotion Week (pictured), focussing on body positivity and substance abuse.

2022 poses an exciting year for Health Studies, with the first cohort of Level 1 Health studies concluding their schooling career in Level 3 Health.

Religious Education

Having bid farewell this year to former chaplain Mr Michael Bennett, St Peter's welcomed Matt Martyn and Vanessa MacCarthy into the Religious Education and pastoral care areas. Matt and Vanessa were so helpful in the way they engaged with marrying curriculum with their chaplaincy role and planning. Vanessa made a significant contribution in the classroom also, teaching RE to Year 9 and Year 10 students. Michael Bennett's contribution to chaplaincy and service leadership in the school have been considerable, he has helped to develop resources for the teaching of RE. Also his impact on the school will be felt for quite a few years to come.

The teaching team in RE grew this year with a total of seven involved in teaching cohorts right through from Year 7 to Year 11. The prep school focused on the origins of St Peter and the influences of Broadhurst in setting up the school back in the 1930s. Year 9 students undertook an analysis of the Gospel of Luke, as well as a minor study on the first Christian missionaries to Aotearoa. In Year 10, students focused on key beliefs of Christianity, including those relevant to Easter and Christmas. Rose Stokes showed impressive creativity in her efforts to develop her students' understanding of Easter beyond the textbook and bible page. Examining the Stations of the Cross, which trace Jesus' suffering and journey towards crucifixion, she and her students created an interactive exhibit in the school chapel, which offered participants the opportunity to engage with the meaning of the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus. These stages or stations included audio recordings, evocative images, and alternative and modernised reflections which served to draw the participant in to the true meaning of the events and beliefs associated with Easter.

With the changes to the way NCEA and Year 11 will look from 2023, there is an opportunity to incorporate an analysis of the major world religions. In recent years classes have looked at the basics of belief and practice of believers in other faiths across the world. In the future it is hoped that the focus will be more specialised and self-directed; offering



each student the ability to find more personal value in the learning process, while still allowing them to develop their understanding of the different faiths and the contribution they have to New Zealand society or indeed the global impact.

The Religious Education curriculum at St Peter's continues to develop students' awareness of Christian belief and influence within the school and beyond. Analysing the geographical, historical, and cultural influences which are so much part of the school's legacy, is no less significant or important. Especially considering how globally connected everyone is in the modern day.

Science

As the Covid pandemic has shown all too well: Science and the knowledge that it brings play an increasingly important role when making decisions that affect people, in a plethora of ways.

The Science Faculty strives to support the learning of every student and aims to prepare them to face their futures with a strong understanding of scientific thinking and the ways in which it can be used to make a positive contribution to the world. It has been exciting to work with each student and to see so many achieve personal excellence this year despite the challenges. Perseverance, curiosity, and willingness to take risks are three-character strengths that are valued highly and readily encouraged.

In addition to the well-resourced faculty and a curriculum designed to allow students to develop their cognitive ability, the Science Faculty also supports numerous co-curricular opportunities including: the Physics and Biology Olympiads, the NIWA Waikato Science Fair, the Otago and ICAS Science Competitions, the New Zealand Engineering Science Competition, Brain Bee Neuroscience competition, and the International Chemistry Quiz. Science is all around – it's a way of looking at and trying to understand the things that can be observed in everyday life. To encourage this perspective in students, the faculty tries to provide as many different experiences and field trips to help students engage in "real world" Science. Unfortunately, due to Covid related restrictions, these were limited in scope this year. The Year 9 visit to the Ecological Sanctuary on Maungatautari was able to continue. They enjoyed a day of hands-on field work and presentations from some local experts. In addition, Level 2 Biologists were able to collect data on ecological contexts at Pirognia.

Social Science

A study of the ancient architecture (and a few sculptures) around the 5th century BC in ancient Greece, culminated in a Year 12 Classics class trip to Auckland to investigate the classical influence on architecture there. After an intense introduction to the Persian wars, which included a personal investigation of one of the battles for an internal assessment, the class looked at the damage done to temples in the Persian invasion of Athens. From the rebuilding programme of Pericles, the majesty of the Propylaea, Parthenon, Erectheion and the tiny Athene Nike temple, their decoration and architectural features could be seen reflected in the 1929 neoclassical War Memorial Museum on top of Pukekawa in the Auckland (Tamaki Makaurau) Domain.

Students also learned about ancient mythology, using the primary sources such as Hesiod, Apollodorus, and Ovid to make links, seeing similarities and differences, between the ancient Greek stories and modern versions like the movie Percy Jackson. The year ended with the epic tale of the journey of Odysseus, back from the Trojan war, and his challenges to get back to his home, wife and son.

Year 13 learning focussed on the Roman world, after the decline of the majesty of the Greek world covered in Year 12. Augustus Pax Romana, bringing peace to Rome through a civil war, changing the political world of Rome, and Roman values set the stage for an investigation into Imperial Art and Literature. The Prima Porta, Ara Pacis, Maison Carree, Pont Du Gard, Flavian Amphitheatre (Colosseum), Arch of Titus, Bust of Vespasian, Trajan's Column and Forum, Hadrian's Bust, Pantheon and Villa all helped students to see how

sculpture and architecture have been used to promote a range of different messages and values in the ancient Roman world. This was all reinforced in Virgil's literary masterpiece, the Aeneid. The story of a Roman hero's journey from the burning city of Troy to Italy in his search for a new home. Looking into the past we can better understand ourselves.

Geography

Optimistic young people are key to solving the planet's most pressing problems. When students are equipped with geographic knowledge, they are empowered to think critically, solve problems, and be the architects of change that this planet needs.

Today's Geography is not rote memorisation of mountain ranges or countries on a map, the way so many learned in the past. Geography today is about seeing the whole picture. It's about seeing the future—and changing the future if they don't like what they see.

The magic of geography is that it cuts across many disciplines. Geography is now integrated throughout other lessons, like history, science, and art, so that learners can engage with real-world issues. Students are encouraged to build an explorer's mindset, and be relentless problem solvers.

Thanks go to Mr Smith, and Mrs O' Leary who keep this goal alive and stay the course offering strong and purposeful 21st Century learning on issues from sea-level rise to human trafficking, urban homicide patterns, tourism in Fiordland, population sustainability, natural hazards and more. All combined with the controversial issues of goldmining and 1080 use in a country striving to be carbon neutral.

As a young student leader said: *"Young people are the world's most untapped resource for hope."*

History

The History department has seen significant growth this year with a range of new topics added to enhance engagement and enjoyment.

Having two classes at Level 3 for the first time was a milestone, showing the importance of the study of history for students at St Peter's. The Level 3 course was designed to show significance to where in the world we live. The New Zealand Wars and specifically the Waikato Wars were explored in Term 1, with real life learning taking place at the battle sites of Rangiaowhia, Orakau and the Alexandra Redoubt of Pirongia. This learning included a battle site tour and engagement with artefacts from the time.

The Salem Witch Trials of 1692 were studied as part of looking at contested history. The students also gained insight into The Cold War and the Vietnam War. The classes were an outstanding group of individuals who have been together over the past three years. A number of the Year 13 students will study history at university and hopefully return as key speakers in the future.

It was something going into it none of us knew a lot about and weren't too interested in, but it really opened our eyes and made us understand the significance of our country's history and its relevance today."

The Level 2 students enjoyed a very successful year studying history. The students covered New Zealand tragedies, conspiracy theories, the rise of the Nazi Party, and the invasion of Poland. In Term 1 the class visited Waiouru and Tangiwai, which supported the students studying significant events in time that have shaped New Zealand society, along with an insight into the life of the youth under Nazi Germany rule.

Level 1 students covered New Zealanders at War, which included for the first time a study of Cambridge's sister city Le Quesnoy and its liberation in World War I with the help of New Zealand soldiers. The War on Terror was introduced and embraced by the students. The students finished the year looking at the ever-important unit on Black Civil Rights. Many of this group will move forward with History at school with either the NCEA or IB programme.

IB students have had a challenging year and persevered well. They have had the opportunity to explore world history and question how the world has developed and changed over time.

A special thanks to all the students who have participated in the History programme during the year and wish them well on the next stage of their journey.

Tourism

The lingering restrictions of Covid again cast its cloud of cancellations around the world, meaning the students had to be adaptable to these frequent adjustments. The focus from the budding tourist operators was to become more skilled and aware of the 'enormous potential' a career in Tourism can offer. Improving their geographical knowledge of NZ, the Pacific Islands, and a range of countries across the planet, as well as travel options, accommodation, natural attractions on offer, and issues like time zones and visa requirements.

The Covid closures on the world's tourism placed added pressure in accessing up-to-date online information in order for students to complete their assignments. The course promotes individual time management skills, accurate information gathering, up-to-date trends, and a motivated work ethic to maintain a regular commitment to assessment completion.

One of the Tourism Industry Level 3 New Zealand standards also requires students to prepare and present a three-day destination itinerary for their own nominated overseas

clients. The range of regional zones included Rotorua, Auckland, Wellington and Queenstown. The engaging Level 3 cohort included Monica Faumui, Lyric Vaetoe, Jordy Horsley, Ashley Herlihy-Watson, Cole McGiven, Sam Mitchell, Diesel Jakeman and Jeroslav Tamala.

The Level 2 course takes in a more global emphasis to broaden a student's geographical awareness and investigate both historical and current tourism issues. Those students mastering a range of Level 2 travel logistics included Sharon Mitchell, Ariana Ormsby, Billie-Jo Hickton, Grace Fraser-Campin, Sera Taei, Lui Skelton, and Rumatiki Williams. Guest speakers from various New Zealand tertiary tourism institutions, such as the Queenstown Resort Tourism College, gave the students an insight into the possibilities and opportunities that may well be part of their lifestyle choices ahead.

Visual Art

The Visual Art Faculty continues to grow and support students with a wide range of opportunities and creative learning experiences. To create, value, and appreciate Visual Art is a gift that enhances perception and gratitude for life. Classes offer each student a well-resourced, safe environment to explore, extend, and experience a broad range of media and processes within a framework of teaching and learning. These skills and creative growth assist students to reflect and choose one of the dual pathways through NCEA and International Baccalaureate available to St Peter's senior students.

Online learning has been a reality again this year with all its challenges and rewards. The wider art community of teachers shared many lessons and ideas which have been integrated into programmes, enhancing the learning on offer. Art students have embraced new processes, ways of thinking and digital presentation of work that has demonstrated that diversity in learning provides more choices for students. Staff have been able to reflect, integrate new ideas, and retain those that provide continued success for student learning. Throughout the lockdowns this year the faculty has stood by their core values of a student-centred philosophy that allows for the development of artworks that contribute value and meaning to life.

Of note during the lockdown period were innovative new assignments. Prep Art students adapted materials exploring how to create and express art through recycled and found objects. Year 9 explored metamorphosis, and Year 10 embraced a photographic investigation of the hidden corners of their home, which provided a foundation for still life drawing.

Senior NCEA and International Baccalaureate students were able to continue on with assessments via online video classes, allowing students to ask for advice with instant feedback and live demonstrations of skills or processes. This continued for the Auckland students with a strong focus on inclusiveness and support.

Junior Art provides two exciting years of diverse experiences. Students begin to recognise their personal style, their "visual voice" and an appreciation of individuality in creativity. Prep classes are scaffolded over two years to ensure students have an introduction to a range of art materials and processes. There are no magical answers hidden in text books in Art. Students are risk taking and resilient when they choose to communicate visually and are respected for their courage. Learning in Visual Art can be messy. Not always in the literal sense, but in the safe failures that are part of the journey to resolve an artwork. These are all embraced in drawing, design, painting, printmaking, photography, and Sculpture through the Junior programmes. Some students select Visual Art as they have a clear vision, thinking ahead to Senior Art, while others enjoy the creative time before moving into other areas of study.

Students enjoy the rigour of more in-depth investigation in their senior years. NCEA fields of practice including design, painting, photography, sculpture and printmaking provide a framework for exploration of contemporary practice and technical skills. In Years 12 and 13 International Baccalaureate Visual Art encourages students to work in not only the traditional fields of drawing, painting, sculpture, design, photography and printmaking but also in fabrics, metal, wood and design and visual communication. It is pleasing

to have a comparative study from an Art History perspective in this course, to provide context and a global perspective of the links between students' creative practice and that of contemporary and historic artists.

Visual Art Photography continues to develop students' technical understanding about the production of quality photographic images whilst also challenging them to consider the ever-evolving role that the photography plays in society, both past and present. Students also have the opportunity to develop their own direction for their personal portfolio. This encourages them to explore a photographic genre that they feel connected to, which subsequently encourages the depth and quality of the learning experience. Opportunities have been facilitated to explore the school's environment, including a visit to Owl Farm in Term 1.

Alongside this, students have taken the opportunity to explore their image making from a philosophical and symbolic perspective. How can they, as students of photography, communicate and apply their technical and conceptual understanding to produce a body of work that is both visually engaging and thought provoking? Our students' creativity has continued to shine through in their photographic work this year.

Using promotional advertising Visual Arts Design students build knowledge and skills to create artworks. Exploring and experimenting with techniques and processes of practicing designers, each student communicates visually on a topic of their interest. Students develop and extend their individual design style through creative expression. Using digital drawing, elements of layout, typography, illustration and imagery they express ideas and comment on the world they live in.

On return to the Visual Art classrooms students were pleased to be back with friends and their teachers in the well-resourced art rooms using the invaluable printing presses, kiln, photographic studios, darkroom and film processing facilities. All students respond positively to the relationships and collaborative learning held in high regard to progress learning. The experienced, passionate creative team enjoy

walking the creative journey with all students across the Visual Art Faculty as together they seek success.

Art: Talk the Talk

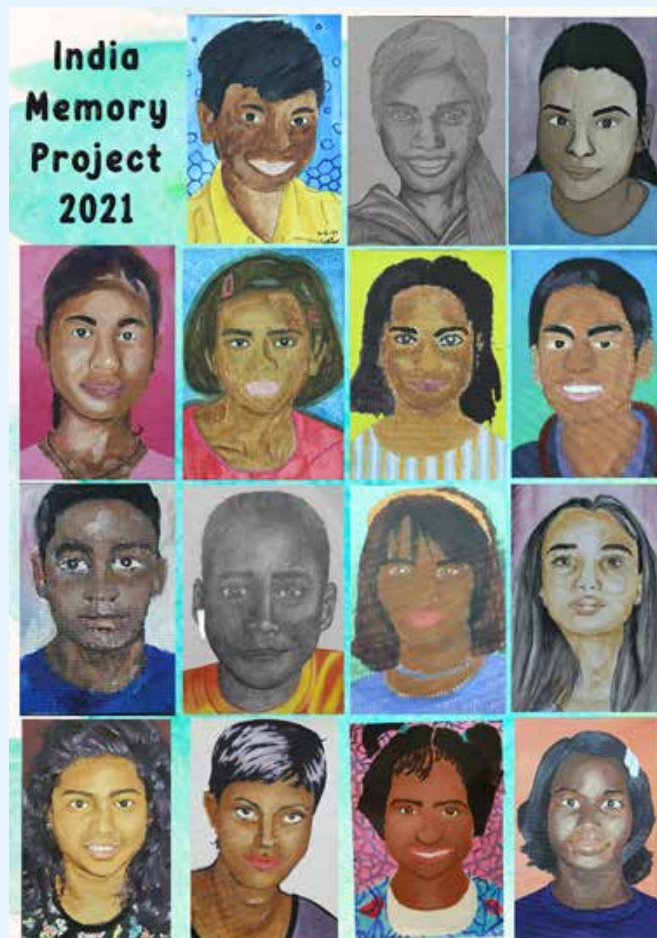

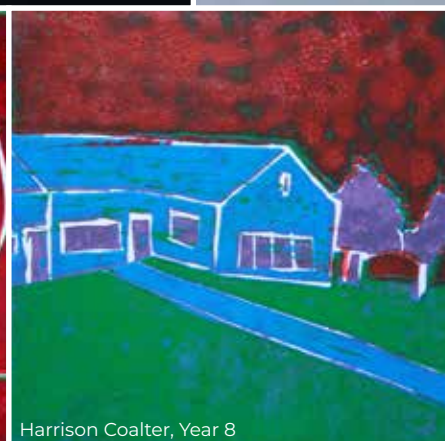

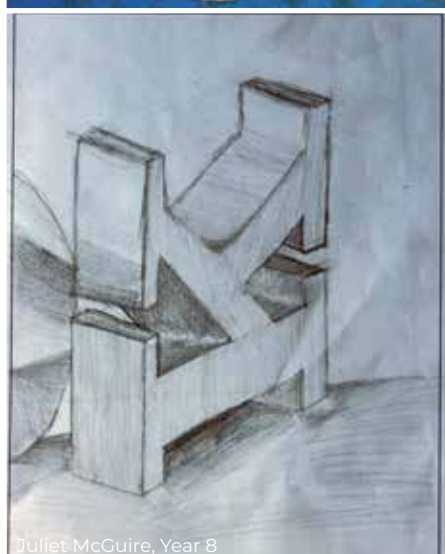

Prep Revolutionize Troupe

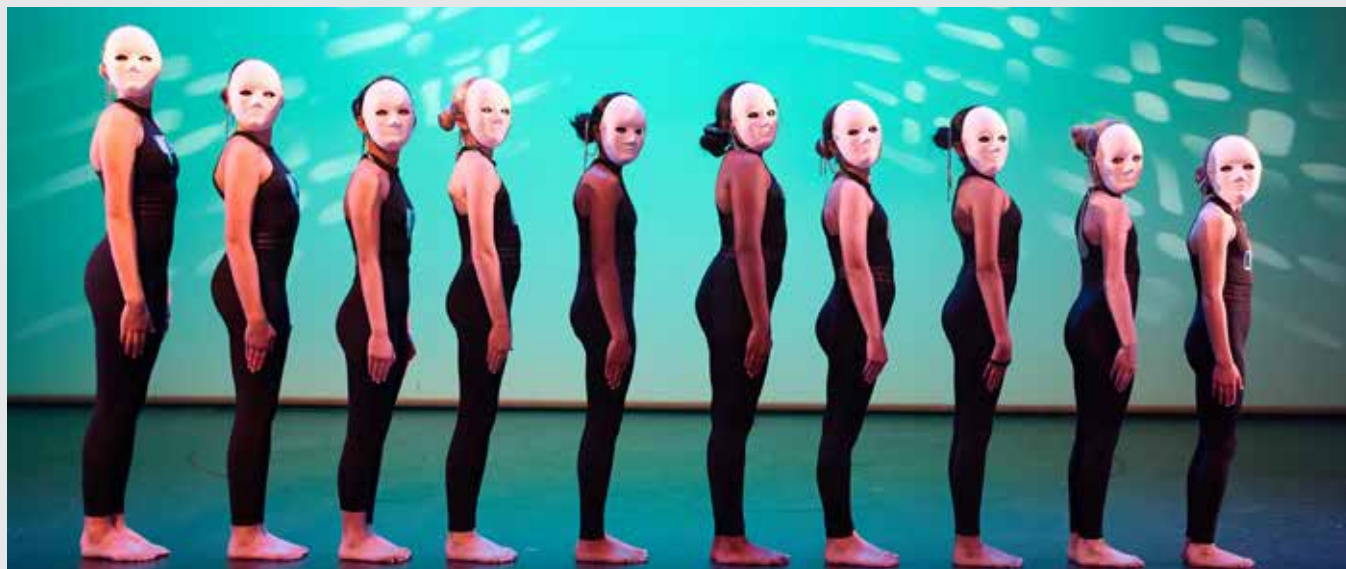

Debating

This club is all about creativity, self-confidence, having fun, and most importantly, community.

Prep Drama Club

Throughout the year Prep students have enjoyed meeting on Thursday lunchtimes to let loose, express themselves and share their acting talents with each other. They have explored character and movement, played a variety of theatre sports-style improvisation games in teams, and rehearsed a choral piece from *Beauty and the Beast* for the Prep Performance evening in Term 3. It has been really appreciated how students have given new ideas a go and have been willing to have fun, even if they sometimes look silly. It has been a great experience for all involved.

Shakespeare Club

The disparate worlds of teenagers and parents, forbidden love, and floor length costumes were the focus of this year's Shakespeare Club. The club explored the dynamics of *Romeo & Juliet* and discovered both the tragic moments and potential for physical comedy in the chosen scene. The heightened language and extreme emotional states of the characters made for lively scene explorations. The weekly commitment to rehearsals culminated at the Hamilton Regional Speech and Drama Competitions, where the performers were awarded Runners Up in the Group Drama category. Looking ahead, the students have expressed interest in directing chosen scenes in order to delve deeper into the works of the world's most popular playwright.

Music

Chamber Ensemble

The Junior Chamber Group and Senior Chamber Group were both new initiatives this year. At their own levels, each group focussed on some of the key elements of ensemble music-making, such as constructive listening, critical evaluation and leadership skills, whilst exploring a range of musical styles and genres. The ensembles used musical works by Shostakovich, Mendelssohn, and other more contemporary composers to discover a range of diverse learning opportunities. Both groups rose well to the challenges of playing together and eventually were able to rehearse effectively with only limited tutor assistance to identify rehearsal priorities. The Senior Chamber Group gave a public performance at school during Term 1, but neither group was able to perform at the later Kammermusik competition due to Covid lockdowns. The musicians in both groups put good effort into developing their existing ensemble skills, preparing for performances, and learning how to work together towards common goals.

Chapel Band

Chapel Band has provided many opportunities of service for our musicians, contributing their talents and their time to ensure the support for our Chaplains. Featuring 12 songs in their repertoire, these students have turned up every Tuesday interval and Wednesday lunchtime, ready to give their best. The challenge of performing in front of your peers each week is not an easy one, but it is one that the group thrives on. Sadly, this year the band says goodbye to a couple of founding members of the Chapel Band in its current format and wish them all the best for the future. Anyone want to play keys?

Guitar Orchestra

This year, the guitar ensemble was comprised of a small, but dedicated, group of Prep students, who were occasionally joined by guest musicians from staff, Mr Ian Cosgrove, Mr Max Stubbs and Mr Daniel Chung. Music ranged from *Purple Haze* by Jimi Hendrix and Ozzy

Osbourne's *Crazy Train*, to *Spring* from Vivaldi's Four Seasons. The band also tackled the challenging *Manha De Carnival*, the theme song to the movie *Black Orpheus* composed by Louiz Bonfá.

One highlight was performing "Hine e Hine" at the Prep Performance Evening. This introduced the young students to the classic "Goodnight Kiwi" TV cartoon, so it incorporated a history lesson too! While small in numbers they have been mighty in spirit and commitment. The group has come a long way in the short time they have been together, as they look forward to 2022!

Impact Percussion Ensemble

Impact, the percussion ensemble for non-percussionists, has grown itself further this year with a committed group of musicians. New members to the group rose to the challenge of playing pitched percussion pieces such as Philip Glass's *Madeira River* and Mr Schroeder's *Something Else is Happening*. There was only one performance for the year at an assembly, sadly missing the opportunity to perform at the Waikato Band Festival and Prizegiving due to lockdowns.

Impromptu lessons on how to repair a vibraphone allowed an exploration and understanding of how tuned percussion works (and what happens when you put the notes back in the wrong places). We farewell several key musicians who have been with the group for a number of years now and thank them for all their contributions.

Jazz Band

This year St Peter's started a Jazz Band. With a rich history of music to embrace, the group began to seek out music to play. Some years ago, the school had a jazz stage band and having found the music for that in the archives, it gave them a starting point! As the band found their skill level, they then acquired music for *Mack The Knife*, a classic popularised by the great New Orleans jazz pioneer Louis Armstrong. The band also went on to play some blues forms and learnt

aspects of improvisation and other essential skills required for playing in a jazz ensemble. The group, comprising of saxophones, piano, drumkit and double bass, bravely tackled some quite challenging music! The band and staff look forward to a fresh start in 2022 hoping to integrate guitar and some brass instruments as well.

Petrafied Phunk

The award-winning 7-piece funk outfit Petrafied Phunk, has had its fair share of success this year. Forging ahead with their own brand of jazz/funk and soul classics, they have made their mark by performing and recording for the wider St Peter's community. During this unusual year, the students have gathered their inspirations, and have come together to arrange and perform timeless funk classics such as *I Believe In Miracles* by the Jackson Sisters, *Think* by Motown legend Aretha Franklin, and *A Night To Remember* by the 1970s/80s Grammy award winning group Shalamar. The latter has been turned into a video/audio recording project during the Covid lockdown period. This enabled each member of the band to individually craft their parts, in a studio-style setting, and has given them an enduring testament of their time within the group, and the Performing Arts department of St Peter's as a whole.

Petra Musica

2021 was an exciting year for Petra Musica, with an interesting programme and several key performance opportunities that were eagerly anticipated. However, many of these key performance events, such as the Waikato/BOP Band and Orchestra Festival ended up being cancelled due to Covid lockdowns. Mr Morton-Jones chose a stimulating array of pieces that expanded many of the orchestral experiences. These pieces ranged from Beethoven's *Pastoral Symphony* to the hit Broadway show *Hamilton*, and included classical, Romantic period pieces as well as drawing from film and theatre works. This repertoire brought challenges in all aspects, however Petra Musica improved steadily throughout the year to perform them with intuitive musical understanding and skill. It is exciting to see the bright future of Petra Musica continue into the future with the talented musicians St Peter's has to offer. We wish departing

St Peter's students luck on their next chapter of musical discovery.

Prep Chapel Band

Prep Chapel Band has had an enjoyable time this year, with a mix of Year 7 and 8 students, including a guitarist, ukulele player, bass player and several singers. They have worked on both familiar songs from last year, and some new songs, such as *How Great is Our God* and *Mighty to Save*. Next year they will be collaborating with the Junior Chapel band on rehearsing some Christmas carols and songs for the annual carol service at the end of the year.

Prep Glee Club

The Prep Glee Club this year has had a 'Musical Theatre' flavour. At the Prep Showcase Evening, the Club performed two contrasting songs - *Johnny One-Note*, the story of a man who could only sing one note but used that note to great effect; and *Rome Wasn't Built in a Day*, a more modern pop song with a great message of resilience. Student solos were combined with ensemble singing, which allowed Prep students to gain useful performance experience and an opportunity to engage with the story-telling aspect of the song.

A number of the sessions were during lockdown, and students remained dedicated through the use of Google Meets. These provided a valuable chance for students to connect and socialise, in addition to enhancing aural skills.

Prep Wind Band

With the introduction of wind Instruments to the Year 7 and 8 music curriculum, Prep Wind Band has continued to thrive with an influx of new and talented young musicians. Using this introduction as a basis for any student wanting to further their interest in wind instruments, Prep Wind Band is an accumulation of the aforementioned prep students, as well as those who already have wind instrument skills. The band rehearse every Monday lunchtime, and have already performed their first whole piece, Rock Selections, at the annual Prep Performance Evening during Term 3. This was a remarkable achievement, which involved students with little

Prep Strings

Now in its fourth year, the Prep Strings programme continues to go from strength to strength, with 2021 seeing a big uptake in the cello section in particular. Current Prep Strings students Molly Scott and Hayley Sherwin both agree that the weekly lessons are not just a great way to learn more about the instruments, but provide a chance to catch up with friends from across the Prep school.

Hayley explains how the programme works, "In Prep Strings, we learn violin and cello. It is optional which instrument you want to play. We learn lots of different songs and in nearly every lesson we play at least one game. I do violin and Miss Griffiths is the violin teacher. Miss Morgan teaches cello." Molly and Hayley both agree that the Prep Performance Evening in Term 3 was a personal highlight. Hayley went on to say, "Prep Strings has taught me a lot about the violin and so many songs. I've always wanted to play violin, even when I was a little girl, and St Peter's has finally made my dream come true".

Over the last 6 years teachers, parents, past and present students wait for this prestigious phenomenon to happen. This year due to restrictions, the current Year 11s, Juniors and Prep boys and girls lined up to prepare to say goodbye as Year 13 students left the Performing Arts Centre. This was followed by a stand-up face to face haka performed by the boarding boys to their Seniors. All in all emotions were very high as the Year 13s' said their final goodbye to their school, teachers and peers.

The Kapa Haka group wish they could have been there to perform the haka in person, but unfortunately this year it was not possible. "Kia pai aa raatou haerenga kei roto i te ao tuuroa". (We wish them well on their journey).

Chitty goes off with a Bang Bang

The St Peter's 2021 senior production, *Chitty Chitty Bang Bang*, ran to packed houses from 7-13 May, delighting audiences with a theatrical experience as "phantašmagorical" as the magical car itself.

Directed by renowned Hamilton director David Sidwell, with musical direction by Sam Cleaver. Ashleigh Gibson, who went above and beyond the call of duty to continue with the show while on maternity leave, deserves a special mention for her dazzling choreography.

Its journey to the stage involved high drama itself when Covid forced the school to temporarily pull the plug on the production just before lockdown last year.

"It was the hardest thing I've ever had to do in my 20 years of teaching," said Director of Performing Arts Stephen Morton-Jones of the moment he had to tell students the show would have to be postponed. "It was heart-breaking actually."

Fourteen Year 13 students from last year's cast who lost their roles and many others who would have been in the crew were given free tickets to this year's opening night.

The *Chitty Chitty Bang Bang* stage show is based on a 1968 musical fantasy film by the same name which was adapted from a novel by Ian Fleming. It follows the adventures of eccentric inventor Caractacus Potts, who restores an old race

car with help from his children, Jeremy and Jemima. After discovering the car has magical properties, the trio band together with Grandpa Potts and Caractacus' love interest, Truly Scrumptious, to save it from the clutches of the evil Baron and Baroness of Vulgaria.

Felix Rowe was outstanding as Caractacus, demonstrating remarkable maturity in his accomplished portrayal of an older man. Natasha Dickie was delightful as Truly Scrumptious, bringing great stage presence and a wonderful voice to her role.

Reid Callaghan and Ella Veitch elicited many laughs in the show's other two principal parts, Baron and Baroness Bomburst; generating gorgeously evil chemistry with their superb comic talent and flair.

Wonderfully whimsical sets conceptualised by professional production designer John Harding combined with gorgeous costumes, evocative lighting, superb props and seamless scene changes evoked a feeling of wide-eyed wonder from the moment the curtains burst open; creating that delightful kid-in-a-candy-store feeling that live theatre is all about.

"Teamwork can make a dream work," sang the cast in one musical number, and it certainly did.

Cricket

1st XI Cricket

The 1st XI had a productive and positive Term 1 of cricket, involving club cricket, traditional school exchanges, and the highly contested Gillette Cup. The team continued with a strong environment both on and off the field and continued to enjoy the history and traditions of the game at St Peter's, with their home being the Pavilion and Cricket Oval.

When they were in Year 10, the current Year 13s were challenged by Blackcap and St Peter's Alumni Tim Seifert to put St Peter's Cricket "on the map". This group have had a significant influence with cricket at St Peter's over the past seasons, leaving cricket at the school in a much better place than it was when they started their journey as juniors.

Year 12 Riley McCullum and Year 13 Sam Powles co-captained and were both instrumental in the team's success. The season was highlighted with records being broken and significant performances throughout. Over the course of the season seven performances were etched into St Peter's cricket history as they were recorded on the honours board in the pavilion - this is the most for any one season since it was put up in 1999.

The team participated in the R.J. Sigley Cup during Term 1, which was the two-day competition within the Hamilton Senior A competition and the 1st XI saw both team and individual success within this competition. This success was the highlight and a credit to the group of players, as the team chalked up scores of 300 plus in four innings with the highest team score recorded of 438 against Hamilton Boys' High School, Senior A. Traditional exchanges continued with away fixtures at Rathkeale College, Francis Douglas Memorial College, and home fixtures against Whanganui Collegiate and Takapuna Grammar School.

Throughout the 2020/21 season Ryan d'Abo led the batting group and scored 1042 runs in all matches, with 741 coming in Term 1. McCullum, Harry Boyle, and James Wakelin all made significant contributions as part of the top order throughout the season. Jake Morey and Lochie Bolstad lead the bowling group while the spinners group of Powles, Benji Bell, d'Abo and McCullum were crucial in creating pressure and controlling key situations.

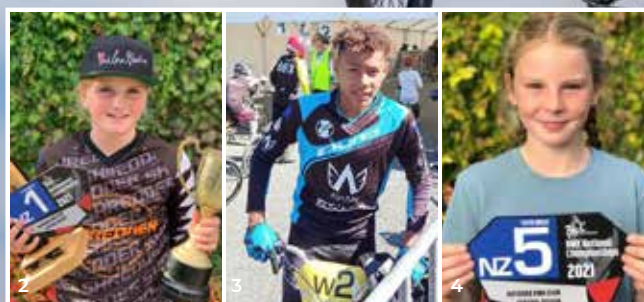

Lily Greenough was undefeated through the motos and rode an exciting final race to claim 2nd in the 14-year-old girls.

Jack Greenough, also undefeated through the motos, unfortunately crashed in the final, so was unable to retain the 16-year-old boys National title.

Bennett Greenough, part of the Schick Civil Construction BMX National Performance Hub, finished 2nd at BMXNZ Nationals and made his debut as a second year elite junior at the UCI BMX World Championships in Papendal, Netherlands in August. He won his qualifying moto group and suffered a flat tyre that ended his hopes in the quarter final. It was a disappointing end, as Bennett rode impressively and topped his group with a win and two second placings, and was among the fastest riders overall.

Bennett earned a ticket to the 2021 UCI Pump Track World Championships after winning the Red Bull qualifier in Cambridge. The event was held in Portugal in October and unfortunately Bennett was unable to attend due to Covid MIQ restrictions.

Equestrian

St Peter's Equestrian Centre had a fantastic year, despite facing challenges due to Covid.

At the beginning of the year the facility was extended, with five new student paddocks built. A new coaching zone was also added, and another coach hired. This increased the amount of riding sessions the school was able to offer to students, which was necessary as they continue to expand with enrolments of equestrian students. Due to the popularity of the Equestrian Centre's coaching and horsemanship programme, it is once again fully subscribed for 2022 with 50 students.

Unfortunately, the New Zealand Secondary Schools Show Jumping competition at Horse of the Year was cancelled, but the centre still managed to host 4 out of 6 of the North Island Inter-Schools competitions at St Peter's.

Three teams attended the North Island Secondary Schools Horse Trials this year, which was a fantastic opportunity for all students. Unlike the inter-schools competitions St Peter's hosts, the entries for this competition were limited, so riders were selected based on their level of competition experience in the eventing discipline. The St Peter's Centaurs 95cm team (Kirsty Henderson, Elizabeth Pennington-Leaney, Emily Ramsden, and Taya Le Normand) placed 3rd and the St Peter's Dragons 80cm team (Ella Jeffares, Amber Funnell, Alice Crofskey, and Megan Bradley) placed 4th. The St Peter's Griffins mixed-height team (Hannah Coley, Charlotte Crofskey and Eleanor Benthien-Parrott) did not place, but were commended for their efforts.

Another exciting expansion for the Equestrian Centre was that of the Equine Assisted Learning for at Risk Kids programme, which doubled in size in 2021. The St Peter's students now educate 10-12 young Hamiltonians in horsemanship, and fundraise to pay for their riding lessons at a local riding school.

Golf

Whilst almost all sporting activity have been interrupted and disrupted by the pandemic, golf has been able to offer itself up as an alternative option.

As an inclusive, easily accessible, open air activity, that can easily maintain required physical distancing, golf has been one of the few permissible sporting activities under Level 3 restrictions. The result has been phenomenal growth in active participant numbers.

The intention of the golf centre at St Peter's is to create a truly welcoming, inclusive programme, offering great flexibility. Students determine when they do it and attach their own meaning of success, in a supportive learning environment, designed to be fun and social.

2021 Highlights

Term 1 – Tsunami of students

After hitting new student numbers highs in 2020, the sport started 2021 with even more students engaged across the various coaching programs. A staggering 120 in the entry level options alone. This continued growth stretched physical and human resources to the maximum, but it also added to the energy and excitement of Term 1 at the Golf Centre.

The school's aspirational golfers returned in good shape following a run of summer tournaments. The NZ Age Group Champs at the Ngaruawahia Golf Club had been postponed due to Covid, and were played in mid-December. Top players, Rhys Thomas and Ing Iadpluem, led the way in the individual standing. Rhys placed 4th in the Under 19 Boys' matched by Ing's 4th placing in the Under 19 Girls event. In the NZSS Teams event the St Peter's 1st team of Rhys, Ing and Zahraa Bester again came close to a podium finishing in 5th place.

Unusually, this was quickly followed by the North Island Age Group Championship at the Hamilton Golf Club in mid-January. Ing and Rhys didn't quite fire, both finishing 10th in their respective Under 19 events. Ben Ambler, Year 10, finished strongly after a poor opening round, finishing 9th placing in the Under 16 Boys.

In February, 5 of the top golfers received invitations to play in the annual Brian Perry Pro-Am Classic, held at the Hamilton Golf Club. The best 40 Under 19 players from North Harbour, Auckland, Waikato, and Bay of Plenty are invited to play alongside New Zealand's best golf professionals and three amateur club golfers. For students it's a great chance to see what the next level of their golfing journey may look like. They get to measure up against their contemporaries from across the upper North Island and it offers an opportunity to meet, connect and network with the wider Waikato Business and golfing community. The 40 Junior Golfers play an event within the event; the top 10 finishers receiving a funding grant from the Brian Perry Trust to help them with their golf expenses. Rhys' 6th place and Ing's 8th saw them benefit from this great initiative.

Week 6 was Summer Sports Tournament week. For golf this means a couple of local WSS events. First up, the Waikato Golf Secondary Schools Matchplay Championship. With the exception of Rhys, all the top squad were in action. As expected, St Peter's players were to the fore. Zahraa top qualified one shot ahead, Ing, George Hodgson, and Ben qualified 4th and 5th respectively to secure places in the top 8 for the knockout rounds. George needed to be in

The school's top four golfers sat this one out and the younger, less experienced golfers were given the task. The 1st team of Ben Ambler, Heart ladpluem, Suwanna McPhee and Lucas Peng, despite being some of the lowest handicapped golfers competing, proved too strong for the opposition and took out the title in impressive fashion. Suwanna led the way with nett scores of 68 and 66.

The 2nd team of Baxter Smith, Jack Saunders, Solomon Zhao and Riley Bennett, stormed home on day two to record the lowest team total for the day and to move up from 5th place to claim 3rd place.

Regular Saturday afternoon golf was back up and running at the Riverside Golf Club, and was well supported.

Term 2 – dominant golf ahead

Golf umbers held strong, even with the traditional Winter Sports competing for student attention.

WSS Intercollegiate Championship was held in late May, at the Hamilton Golf Club. Cool windy conditions and firm fast greens made for very tricky conditions and patience was required in large doses. As expected, the St Peter's top team, Rhys 74, Ing 76, Zahraa 73 and George 80 were far too strong and comfortably retained the provincial title. In a bit of an upset, the 2nd team, led by an outstanding 74 by Heart ladpluem and well supported by Ben Ambler, Suwanna McPhee, and (Year 7) Lucas Peng, stormed home to take the runners-up spot.

The long mid-winter end of term break provided the first opportunity for the return of competition and they came thick and fast throughout the 3 week "break".

The three girls were first up, playing the Ruth Middleton Memorial at Matamata. Ing was the best of three girls, but never really got it going and finished 7th. Zahraa couldn't find the form that had won her the event in 2020 in finishing 18th, and Suwanna finished in 21st continuing her good progress in Senior Open events.

Two days later the boys joined in the action for the Junior Kaimai Classic, at the Mt Maunganui and Omanu Golf Clubs. Again, the squad came to the fore. Ing repeating her 2020 win and again pushed hard by Zahraa.

St Peter's had a wonderful season in 2020-2021, and while the season was slightly interrupted yet again due to Covid, the crews did get to finish the season with at the New Zealand Secondary Schools Champs. A bumper season with regard to numbers, which saw an increase across the board in all programs – competitive, learn to row, winter rowing, and Year 7 and 8 rowing.

Putting the disappointment of no NISS Champs and the cancellation of the second day of the Aon Junior Regatta behind the team, they had a brilliant week of racing at the NZSS Champs. This was the first time that all athletes got the opportunity to compete at Maadi and were divided into two squads – Blue Squad (larger competitive squad) and Red Squad (smaller squad). A team of 83 athletes raced in amazing conditions and made it through to 14 A Finals, 11 B Finals and 2 C Finals. The whole Blue Squad made it through to finals and handful of the Red Squad also made it to a final.

Overall the team came home with 2 silver and 2 bronze medals and placed 20th equal in the Star Trophy for Overall Champion School with 8 points (along with Gisborne Boys'). Rangi Ruru finished 1st, with 47 points and Auckland Grammar in second with 30 points and Dunstan High School nabbing third on 28 points. An interesting fact was that St Peter's made just as many A finals as Rangi Ruru and one less than Auckland Grammar, just without the same medal conversion rate.

Standout performances were made by Connor Davison and Toby Robinson, winning two medals each by picking up bronze in the U17 Double and being part of the silver medal winning U17 Boys Quad (along with Karim Tuikin, George Muir and coxswain Esme MacGillivray). Leti Hay, Emma Dover, and coxswain Aarushi Nanjappa also picked up two medals each, winning silver in the U18 Novice Quad (along with Arabella Frojan-Barrio and Genie Tuck) and then in an incredibly close race picking up bronze in the U15 Octuple with Charlise Davison, Meg Hazlett, Keana Woodfield, Amber Singh, Zara Burns, and Georgia Wenham.

With NISS being cancelled they decided to give out NISS medals based on the NZSS results, which saw the school's four medal winning crews also pick up NISS medals and four more crews win medals. Both the Maadi silver medal winning crews, U17 Boys Quad and U18 Novice Girls Quad won NISS Gold medals and the two bronze medalists – U17 Boys Double and U15 Girls Octuple both won NISS silver medals. The following crews picked up NISS bronze medals – U16 Girls Eight, U16 Boys Eight, U15 Girls Eight and U15 Girls Quad.

The Aon Junior Regatta gave rowers their first chance to row in St Peter's colours and the team had a superb day making 37 A Finals and 10 B Finals. Unfortunately the finals day on Sunday was cancelled due to a Covid lockdown coming into place at midnight.

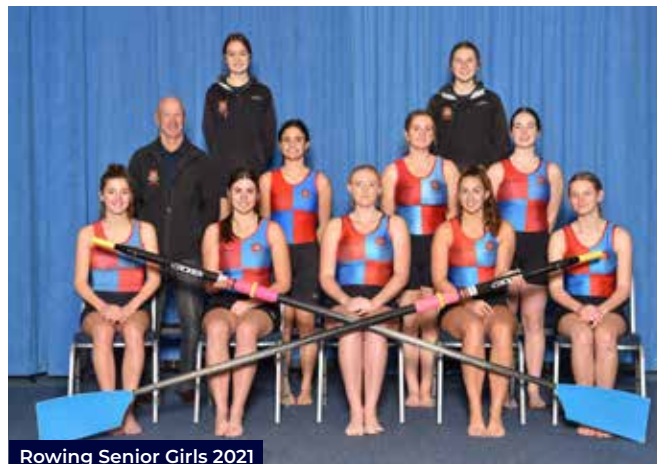

1st XV

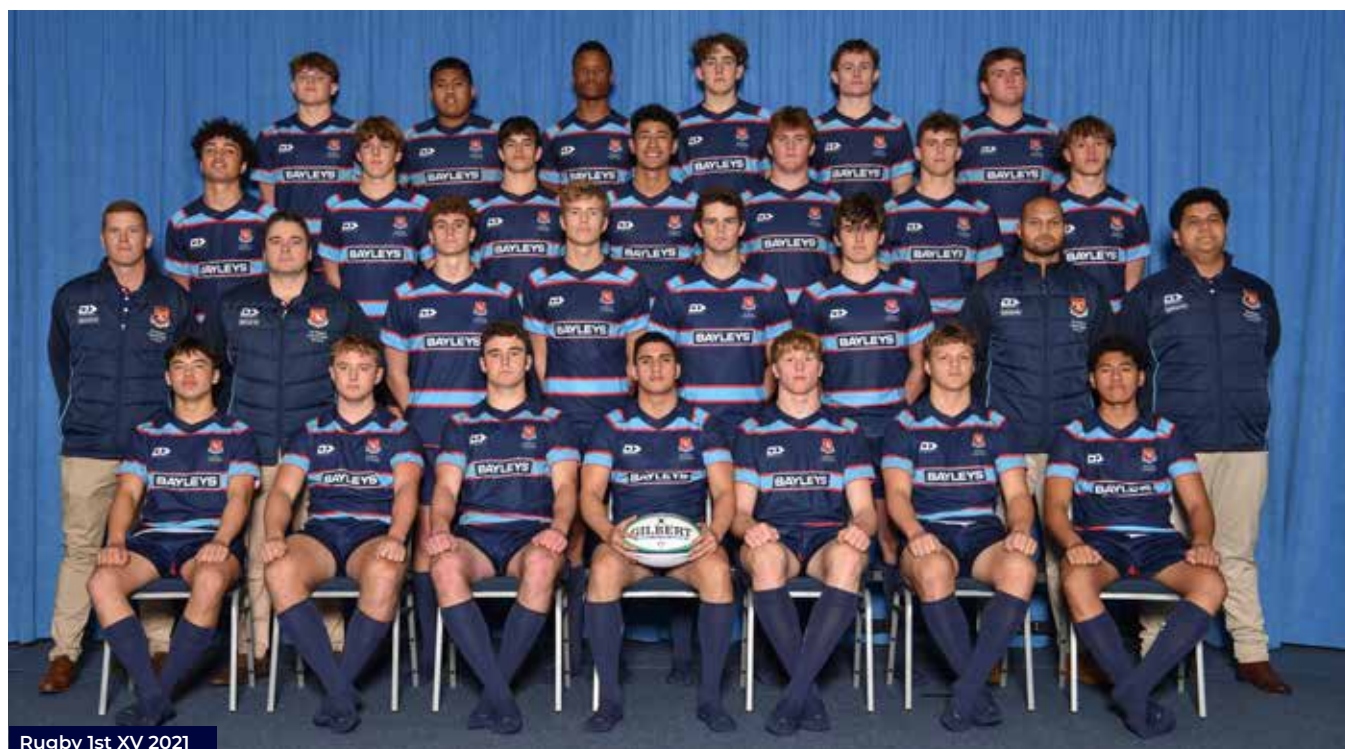

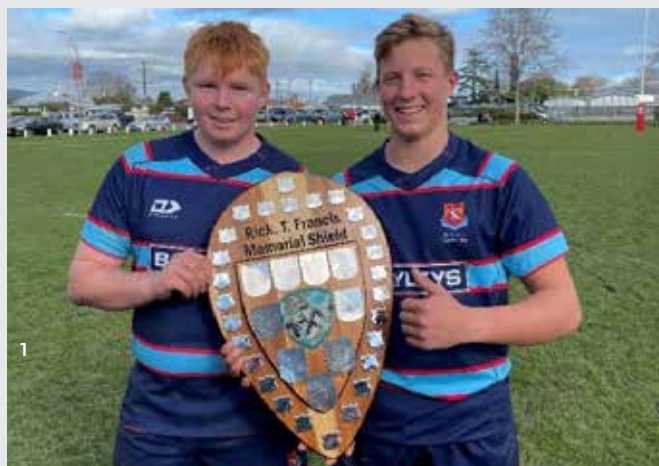

Each session focused on developing basic skills, as well as interactive games to test the skill-set of the students.

Although the season was interrupted by Covid and level changes, 21 sessions were delivered and covered fundamental sport-specific skills, including: forehand drive, backhand drive, pushing, service, smashing, footwork, as well as the basic rules and tactics. The group was small, with students from all year groups. It was great to see the enthusiasm and development of the players across the season, especially the younger Year 7 and 8 students. This was the first year an external coach has delivered the sessions with notable differences in skills observed for every participant.

Unfortunately, in 2021 the competitions such as AIMS games and National Secondary Schools events were cancelled, meaning St Peter's students did not get the opportunity to test their skills against others from around the country. This will likely remain a driving force for those students to practice

harder and prove themselves at next year's competitions. A highlight was having two St Peter's students, Bogie and Zac, selected and compete for Waikato junior teams at the Northern Region Table Tennis Teams Championships held in June.

Oliphant House

As 2021 commenced, the leadership team established a defined vision for the house. The goal was to create the house of 'Oli Men' - someone who has a genuine sense of belonging, who shows courage, empathy, gratitude, and who takes ownership over his actions.

The success of this change was evident when the noise levels grew, genuine connections were reinforced between the year levels, and more importantly, the boys were out of their rooms and (mostly) off devices. We watched with great interest the growth and development of the young men in this house, as they began to find their feet and establish themselves on the sporting field, within school leadership, cultural and/or academic pursuits. This year the Oliphant boys had lead roles in the school production, as well as contributing behind the scenes. You all have my utmost respect for how you have handled the whole situation.

In 2021, we said our distant farewells to our leadership team - Jonty Short, Adam Langlands, Andrew Smith, Daisuke Fujiwara, Harry Boyle and Sam Minnett. One of Covid's great

steals this year was that of robbing a chance to formally recognise these young men. I would like to thank you for your efforts in the House this year; although you will be missed, your contribution will not be forgotten by the staff or the boys in Oliphant. These are young men of real quality and great potential, when we talk about legacy, we are certainly referencing your impact on this boarding house. We will watch your progress with great interest.

All these achievements and successes would not be possible were it not for the fantastic staff team who share a common vision for Oliphant House. I would like to express my gratitude and appreciation to our Matron - Nicola Graham, and House Assistants: Jason Morgan, Ropate Nasau, Justin Stafford, and Fin Sherlock-Ludlow. I am continually impressed by, and appreciated watching, your styles and relationships strengthen over the year, and look forward to building on them in 2022.

I would like to leave you with an anonymous quote left to me by my predecessor, "It is easier to build boys than fix men". 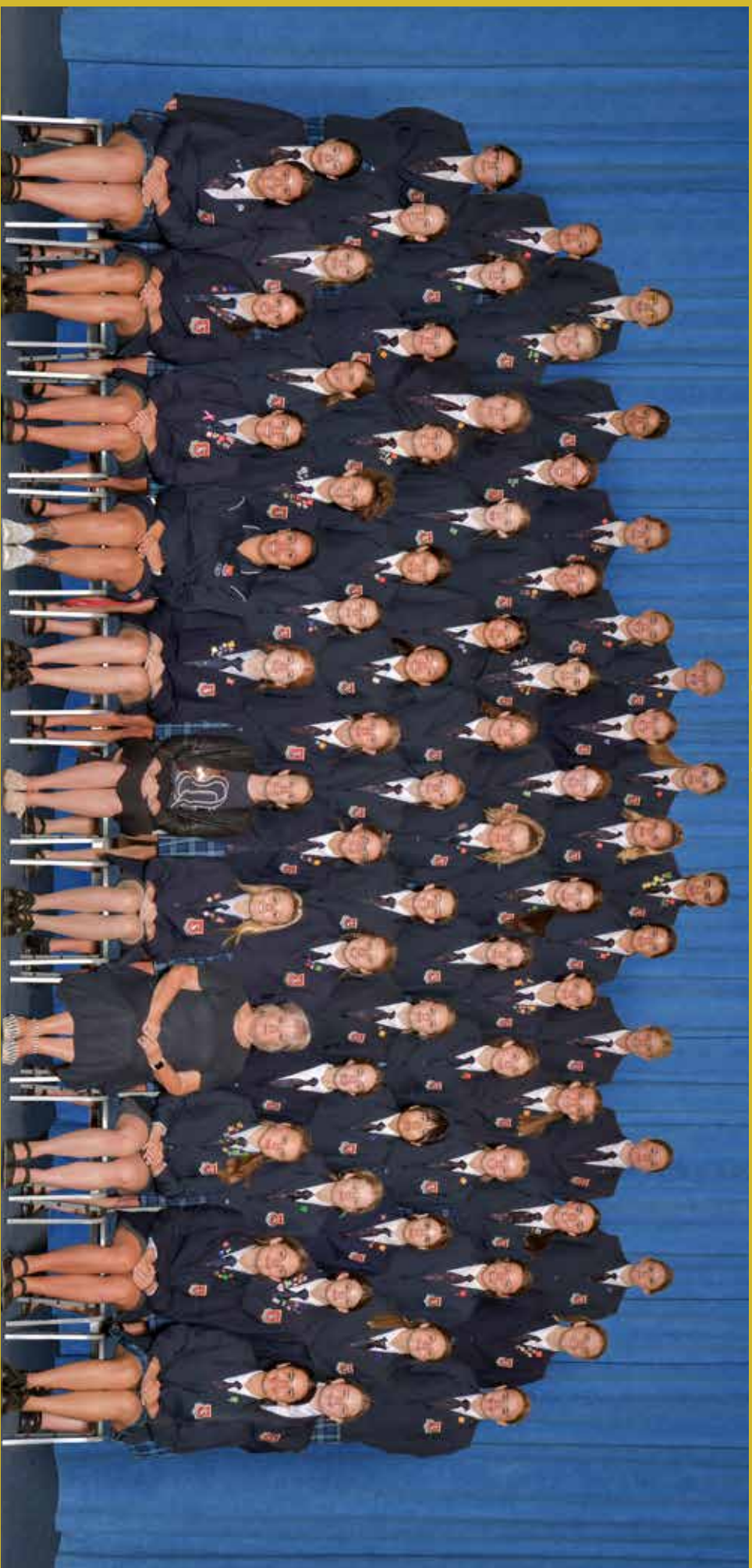

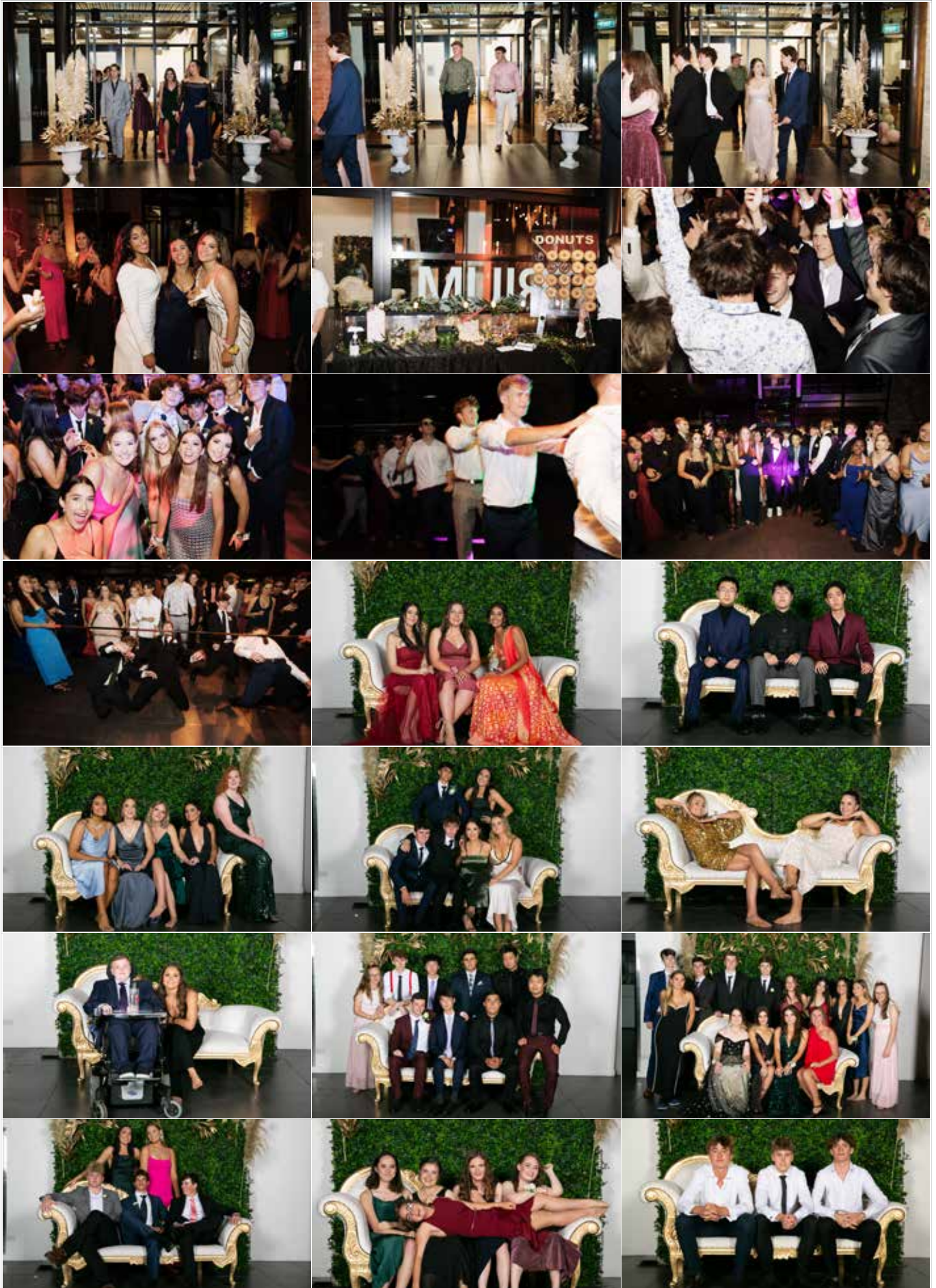




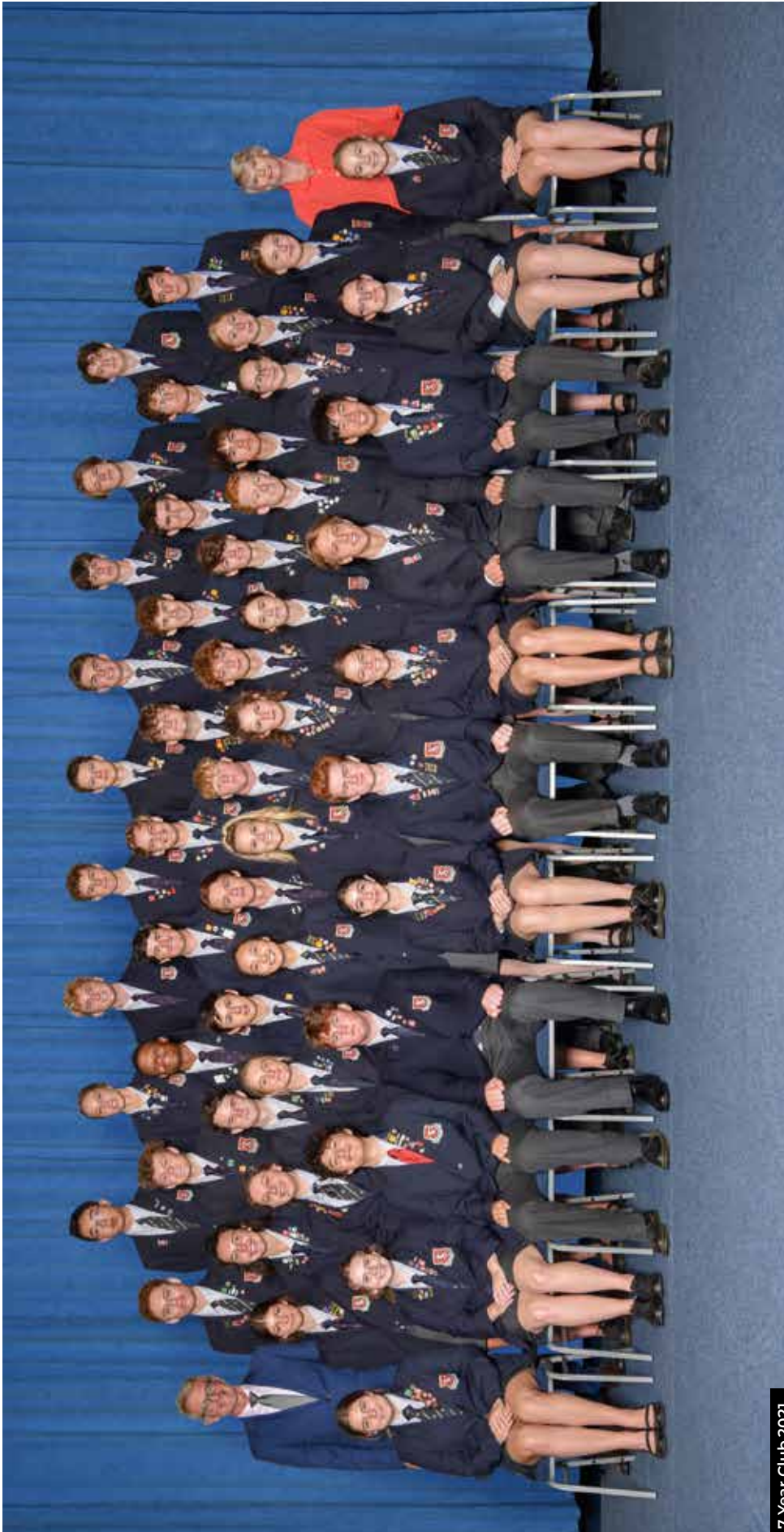

Waipā Youth Awards

The annual awards recognise the outstanding achievements of Waipā youth in academic, arts and culture, community service, leadership and sport categories. Run by Waipā District Council, the awards are now in their 19th year and open to people aged 14–18 years who live in Waipā or have attended school in our district.



Academic Honours

St Peter's students achieved outstanding academic results in 2020, pass rates exceed most decile 10 schools, making St Peter's one of the top achieving schools in New Zealand.

Highest achieving students from 2020 were recognised in the annual Scholars' Awards Ceremony.

The students who have achieved an average Grade Point Average mark of 75 plus in five subjects for NCEA or an equivalent standard in the International Baccalaureate Diploma are awarded with either a Scholar's Tie (for the

first time this standard has been reached), the Silver Owl (for the second time the standard is reached) or a Founders Scholarship (for the third year the standard is reached).

In addition, the students who achieve an average Grade Point Average mark of 90 plus, an Academic Honours Badge is awarded. The badge has a Year 11 bar, a Year 12 bar and a Year 13 bar to recognise those who consistently achieve at this very high standard.

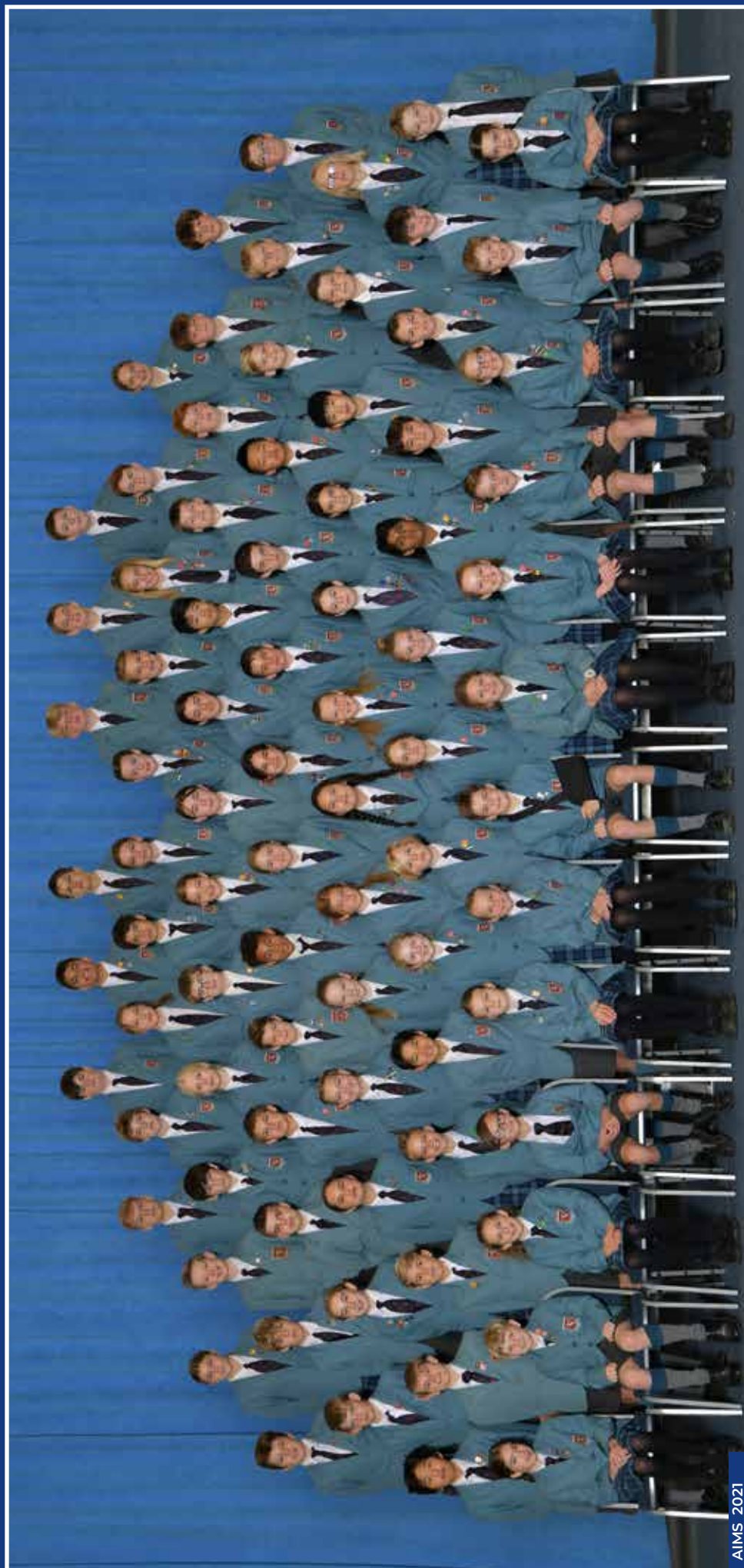

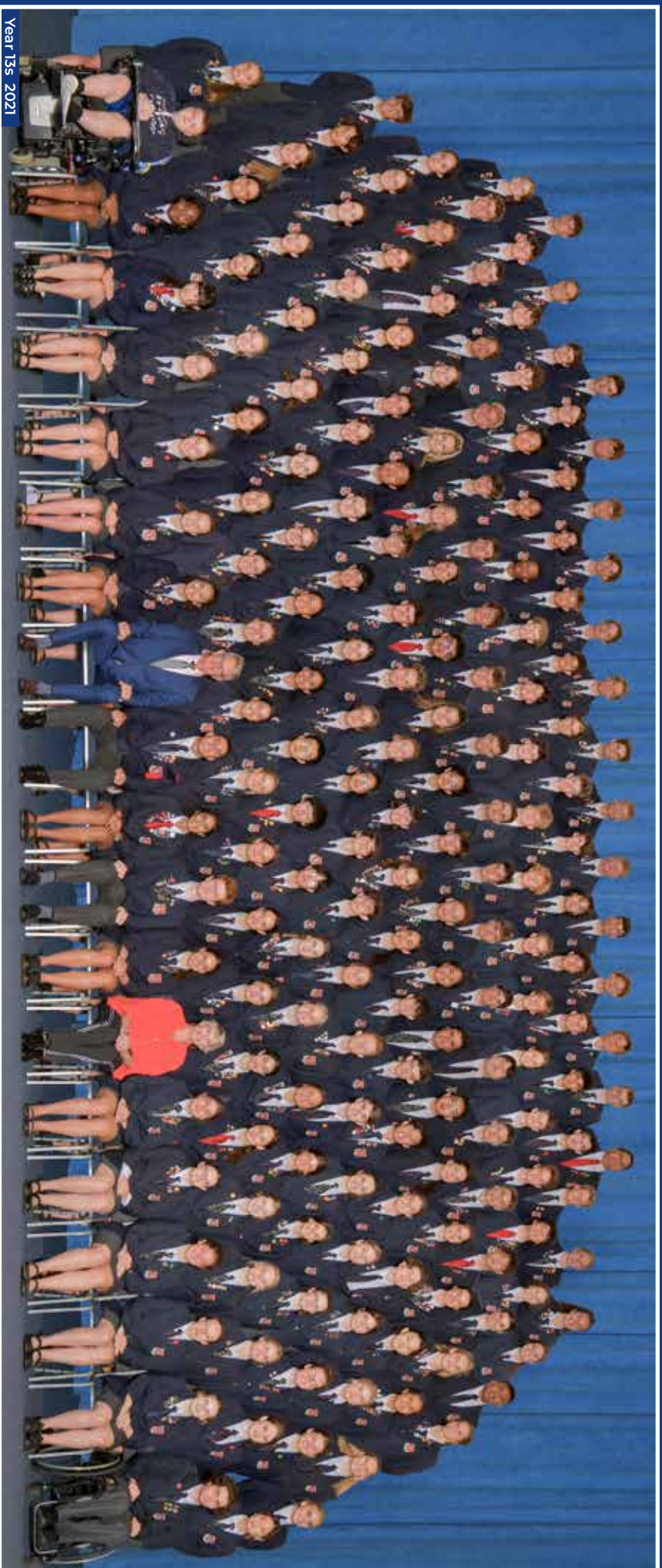
